

Solon Decries 'Aid' to Japan

Washington Senator Sees US Already in War to Get Profits

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va., July 6.—(P)—Senator Lewis B. Schwellenbach (D-Wash.) asserted tonight that the United States, "for the filthy profits involved," was aiding and cooperating in the destruction of China by Japan.

"So far as China and Japan are concerned," he said, "it isn't a matter of us getting into the war—we already are in the war."

"We are in the war in violation of a treaty which we signed with China in order to gain an advantage which we sought. The background of our relations with China should make that treaty the most sacred of any ever written."

Schwellenbach, speaking before the University of Virginia's institute of public affairs, said "were it not for the assistance of the

United States, Japan's Chinese campaign would probably have collapsed many months ago." He cited figures to show that the United States furnished the bulk of the materials needed by Japan to carry on her undeclared war.

Pact Violated, Belief

"To make this situation even more humiliating," he added, "it is in direct violation of treaty obligations upon our part toward China" as contained in the nine-power pact.

"We in congress are in the midst of a vigorous debate over what we should do in event war comes to Europe," he continued. "We have no treaty obligations in Europe. We do have most definite and sacred obligations in Asia. Yet, we almost completely neglect consideration of them even though respect for them would probably materially lessen the chances of the European war we so much fear."

Senator Schwellenbach, and a republican speaker on the program, Col. Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., were agreed on one point—that American participation in a world war would be likely to bring an end to this nation's democratic form of government.

Japan Greeted 3d War Year

Statements by Premier Reflect Concern Over Third Powers

TOKYO, July 6.—(P)—Premier Baron Kichiro Hiranuma and several of his ministers, commemorating the second anniversary of the Japanese-Chinese war tomorrow, issued statements tonight which were characterized by preoccupation with problems presented by third powers.

Japan "must crush any power" that obstructs her program of creating a new order in east Asia," the premier declared.

Britain was a particular target of the statements not only because of the present dispute at Tientsin, where Japanese were blockading the British and French concessions, but because of the statements declared had developed into outright assistance to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek.

As for the United States, Hiranuma said, "It is now clear that American sentiment toward this country has improved, but I am in no position to give definite facts."

Border War Dismissed

The premier briefly dismissed the present Manchoukuo border fighting between Japanese troops and soviet Russian-Outer Mongolian forces, terming it the result of an "invasion" of Manchoukuo by soviet Mongolian troops.

"Nothing is known about the soviet union's intentions but there is nothing to fear since internal conditions in Russia prevent any real challenge," Hiranuma declared.

War Minister Lt. Gen. Selshiro Itagaki said, "It is now clear that Japan's immediate enemy is not only the Chungking government. Any maneuver on the part of the pro-Chiang countries must be crushed and the nation must be fully prepared to cope with any possible world crisis."

Foreign Minister Hachiro Arita asserted that internal dissension was rife at Chungking and the "desire for peace is growing daily among far-sighted members of the Kuomintang (Chinese government party)."

Prospector Saved From Starvation

REVELSTROKE, BC, July 6.—(CP)—Anton Jacobson, 59-year-old prospector, was brought here today by searchers who found him in a lean-to cabin where he had lain virtually without food for three weeks after being struck a paralyzing blow by a falling branch.

Constable M. Grahame of the British Columbia police and Jorgen Gunnarsen, an experienced woodsman, found Jacobson on the banks of Canyon creek, about 12 miles from here. He was able to accompany them to Revelstroke on foot after receiving a little food.

Jacobson said he lost consciousness when a heavy branch fell from a tree and struck the upper part of his body while he was working on a mineral claim. He said he lay helpless for two days before he was able to crawl two miles to the rough shack built by some trapper on Canyon creek. Jacobson said water and tea provided his only sustenance during the three weeks he waited for help to arrive.

Exchange of Land Okehed in House

WASHINGTON, July 6.—(P)—A bill to authorize the exchange of former Oregon and California railroad and Coos Bay wagon road grant lands, now owned by the government, for lands of equal value now held by private, state or municipal interests passed the house today and went to the senate.

The legislation would make it possible, proponents said, for both the government and counties to exchange cut-over lands in the blocking of areas suitable for timber production and have a beneficial effect on the sustained-yield timber-cutting program.

Under existing law, exchanges of re-vested and reconveyed lands in Oregon are limited to timbered lands held in private ownership.

Three Sentenced On Fishing Count

ROSEBURG, July 6.—(P)—Roseburg's "bootleg fish" case was virtually closed today when sentences were imposed upon three men in Roseburg justice courts.

Sale of illegally caught salmon to the Roseburg Rod and Gun club for its 1938 salmon bake was involved.

Irving Davis, Winchester, and Stuart Taylor, Wilbur, who pleaded guilty to catching salmon in closed waters, were paroled from 90-day jail sentences. Frank Bennett, Eugene, who pleaded guilty to negotiating sale of the fish to the club, was fined \$100 and costs.

C. W. Parker, Roseburg garage-man, chairman of the committee which purchased the fish, pleaded innocent to possession of illegally caught fish and asked a change of venue.

It Is a Small World—30 Days

PORTLAND, Ore., July 6.—(P)—"H-m-m-h," mused Acting Municipal Judge J. J. Quillen today as Edward D. Johnson stood before him, accused of drunkenness, "I've seen you before."

Yamhill Requests Survey of River

McMINNVILLE, July 6.—(P)—A request to Senator Charles McNary (R-Ore) for a "complete Yamhill river district" survey by army and navy engineers was made today by Yamhill county.

The request was the first step in a drive to obtain river development and flood control projects for Yamhill county, either as part of the Willamette valley project or as independent improvements.

Carl Francis, Dayton attorney recently appointed by Governor Sprague to the Willamette basin advisory commission, said, "redesigning the Yamhill river from its confluence with the Willamette to McMinville had been authorized by congress and was included in the report of the chief of army engineers to the secretary of war last year."

Yamhill county seeks an appropriation to carry out the authorization. The Yamhill is the only tributary of the Willamette classified as navigable.

Work Is Stopped On Dam by Strike

PORTLAND, July 6.—(P)—Work stopped on two new units of the Bonneville dam powerhouse today as more than 200 American Federation of Labor union members struck in a wage dispute with the Hoffman Construction company.

No pickets were posted pending a settlement conference scheduled for tomorrow.

The dispute arose, said B. R. Mathis, secretary of the Portland Building Trades council, when carpenters struck for a full day's pay for 7½ hours of work on the midnight shift. The strike spread through union metal workers and other AFL members.

Mathis "charged the dispute was caused by the company's interpretation of two working agreements, one for 'heavy' jobs, the other for building construction. Mathis asserted the

McNutt Gives Boom Go Sign

Former Indiana Governor Sees FDR; Announces He'll Quit Job

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After a two-hour luncheon meeting with the president, the former governor of Indiana announced that he would resign his post in the islands within a month or six weeks.

Without disclosing whether Mr. Roosevelt had encouraged or discouraged him to run for the presidency, he reported they had had a delightful time together.

"Efforts are being made on your behalf by friends in Indiana?" a reporter suggested. "Will they stop now?"

"I see no reason why they should stop," McNutt replied.

Previously, at a press conference conducted shortly after he arrived in the capital this morning, the commissioner said everything that had been done in his behalf had been on the assumption that President Roosevelt would not be a candidate for a third term.

Says He's Loyal

Pressed for a statement as to whether he would seek the nomination in event the chief executive was also in the running, McNutt declared:

"I'm loyal to the man who is my chief."

Asked by reporters at the White House whether he and the president have discussed the third term question, McNutt said that would have to answer that.

In response to another question as to whether there had been talk of his taking "the other half of the ticket"—the vice presidency—the commissioner said that had not been discussed.

Good naturedly, he asked the newsmen:

"Please give me a break and let me keep my mouth shut until things open up a little bit."

Asked whether he thought the road was clear now, he declined to express an opinion.

He said reports received by those who had been working in his behalf were "quite pleasing."

"In what localities were they most pleasing?" a reporter asked.

"You might be surprised," laughed McNutt. "I was."

Buckner Rapped Two Years, \$2500

Penalty Far Less Than Maximum Imposed For Fraud, Conspiracy

NEW YORK, July 6.—(P)—William P. Buckner, Jr., a convivial young promoter who took chorus girls and champagne to Washington ostensibly to lobby vainly for legislation to redeem defaulted Philippine railway bonds, was sentenced today to two years in prison and fined \$2,500 for mail fraud and conspiracy.

The maximum penalty for him, and for his so-called "bottle man," William J. Gillespie, a fellow broker, would have been 37 years imprisonment and \$24,000 in fines. Gillespie was sentenced to 18 months and fined \$2,500; Felipe Buencamino, a member of the Philippine national legislature, to 18 months and fined \$5,000. The insular politician was convicted only of conspiracy; Buckner and Gillespie of conspiracy and of mail fraud in seven counts as well.

The three stood silent and more or less composed as Federal Judge Henry W. Goddard pronounced sentence. Buckner, however, lost the suavity which had characterized him during the trial, and flushed deeply.

As he left the courtroom under bond, effective pending arrangements for his probable appeal, Buckner was surrounded by commiserating young women, one of whom wept openly and bitterly.
