Settlement Is Had by Lowes

Accident Claim Settled for \$1375 in Favor of Injured Boy

The probate court yesterday appointed Jessie E. Lowe guardian of her 11-year-old son, Eugene, and authorized settlement of a \$1375 accident claim against Robert Judson for \$1375. The lad was injured about the face when his bicycle was struck by a motor vehicle driven by Judson at McGilchrist and East Nob Hill streets November 9, 1938, the order recited.

Scout Camp News Letter

CAMP PIONEER, July 6—With the floor and walls already constructed and the rafters raised, Boy Scout leaders expect the first meal will be served in the camp kitchen tomorrow night. The only work necessary to complete the construction of the kitchen is to split a few more shakes and place them on the roof.

The camp kitchen will serve the purpose of keeping the food clean and sanitary, while at the same time it will be a permanent building in which the Scouts may store camp equipment for the winter. The lodge, of which the kitchen is the first unit, will be the only permanent building in the camp. There will be several frames to hold canvas.

Another new pioneering project is putting floors in all of the patron tents where the boys will sleep. This will keep their blankets or sleeping bags and personal property cleaner.

All this work, as in the past, is being done by scouts and scouters. All of the furniture, such as the tables for the dining hall, was made by scouts. The handicraft shop, dock, bridges, playground, camp sites, campfire circle, and other improvements were constructed by scouts during the hour that is set aside each morning for projects. Many have found it practical to apply this work to their advancement.

Vista Water Bids Are Due July 15

Bids for construction of the Vista Heights water district's suburban water south of Salem will be opened at 7:30 p. m. July 15 at the offices of Dwight Lear, 202 Oregon building, W. R. Newmyer, chairman of the Heights' commission, announced yesterday.

The proposals asked are to include furnishing and installing the mains and fittings.

Directors Will Aid in Changes

School Reorganization Board Meet for First Time Here

Directors of the school districts in Marion county will be consulted before any steps are taken to effect boundary reorganizations under the 1939 equalization act, the county school reorganization committee decided at their first meeting.

The committee selected as members at large John T. Pias of Crooked Finger, Joseph J. Keber of Mt. Angel and Eugene Finlay of Looney Butte, subject to their now being members of local school boards.

County Superintendent Agnes C. Booth is chairman and other members, are County Judge J. C. Slegmund, County Assessor R. "Tad" Shelton and Chairman M. Weinacht of the non-high school board.

The committee plans to call a conference of all school directors in the county in the fall following the harvest season. Superintendent Booth said. From them will be ascertained the sentiment for

or against district boundary changes throughout the county and any local problems that the committee should consider in formulating the reorganization plan contemplated by the new law. The act is intended to bring about more nearly equal tax rates and operating conditions in the various school districts.

Rare Action Used To Gain Judgment

Confessions of Judgment Entered by Livesley, Mrs. Paulus

Judgments of nearly \$10,000 each were taken in circuit court here yesterday against Dorothy Edna Paulus and T. A. Livesley by C. C. Bryant, receiver for the defunct First National bank in Salem, in a seldom-utilized voluntary procedure.

No suit had been filed. Formal confessions of judgment and waivers of suit action were entered by Mrs. Paulus and Livesley, in settlements of amounts due from them on assessments against their stock in the bank. The confessions recited that \$2900 had been paid on two 50

per cent assessments against 118 1/2 shares of stock held by Mrs. Paulus, leaving \$9386.17 principal due in addition to interest. Except for \$550 due from Livesley on 11 shares held by himself, judgment was for the same sums against him on the grounds that he was liable on the Paulus stock because he had transferred it to Mrs. Paulus within 60 days before the date of the bank's failure.
