Sister Stuedle's Last Rites Said

Pioneer Convent Member Dies at Mt. Angel at Age of 72

MT. ANGEL—Funeral rites for Sister M. Clara Stuedle, pioneer sister of the Benedictine convent at Mt. Angel, were held from the convent chapel at 10 a. m. Wednesday morning with Rt. Rev. Abbot Thomas Meier and Rev. Maurus Snyder taking part. Rev. Bede Rose preached the funeral sermon. Interment was in the private convent cemetery.

Sister Clara was born in Niederbueren, St. Gallen, Switzerland, July 18, 1866, and came to Oregon to enter the convent here October 24, 1899. She pronounced her vows in April, 1891, and soon after was sent to the Indian missions at Grand Ronde and later to the Kakawis missions on Vancouver island, B. C., where she was superior for a number of years.

She was also employed in the abbey kitchen and at Albany and for several years as a novice mistress. For the last six months she was more or less confined to her bed.

She is survived by a nephew, Monsignor Paul Hugentobler, prefect apostolic of Tsitsikar, Manchoukuo, China, and several other nieces and nephews in Switzerland.

Irrigation Tour Set July 10-11

Polk County Farms That Have Water Systems to Be Visited

DALLAS—The annual Polk county irrigation tour will be held on Monday and Tuesday, July 10 and 11. The "tour" will be a series of meetings to study different types of irrigation equipment and types of crops and uses of irrigation.

It is contemplated that there will be an opportunity to observe systems with shallow lifts and one operating under a head of 199 feet which is somewhat of a record in the Willamette valley.

High pressure sprinklers and flood irrigation will be observed. At one stop, according to County Agent W. C. Leth, there will be an opportunity to observe a new low pressure type of stationary sprinkler head which is on the market this year for the first time and which is a new development.

Truck Irrigation Foreseen
Irrigation of potatoes and other truck crops, small fruits, hay and pasture will no doubt be the uses to which irrigation water is put in the trip arranged by County Agent Leth.

Most of the farms to be visited will be those on which new projects have recently been established. Those wishing more information about the trip are asked to inquire at the county agent's office.

Norris Injured In Logging Camp
