**Sewer Extension Bids Held High**

SILVERTON—Because all bids for the proposed sewer extension at Silverton in their original form were too high, the city council took under advisement those submitted at council Monday night. The lowest bid was that of Soule & Watters at \$14,831.71.

Mayor Zetta Schlador appointed a committee to select a contractor for the sewage treatment plant.

Dr. A. W. Simmons, in behalf of the water commission, reported the home of 34 people were on sewer lines but were not connected up to the sewer. Simmons asked that an ordinance be passed to enforce these connections.

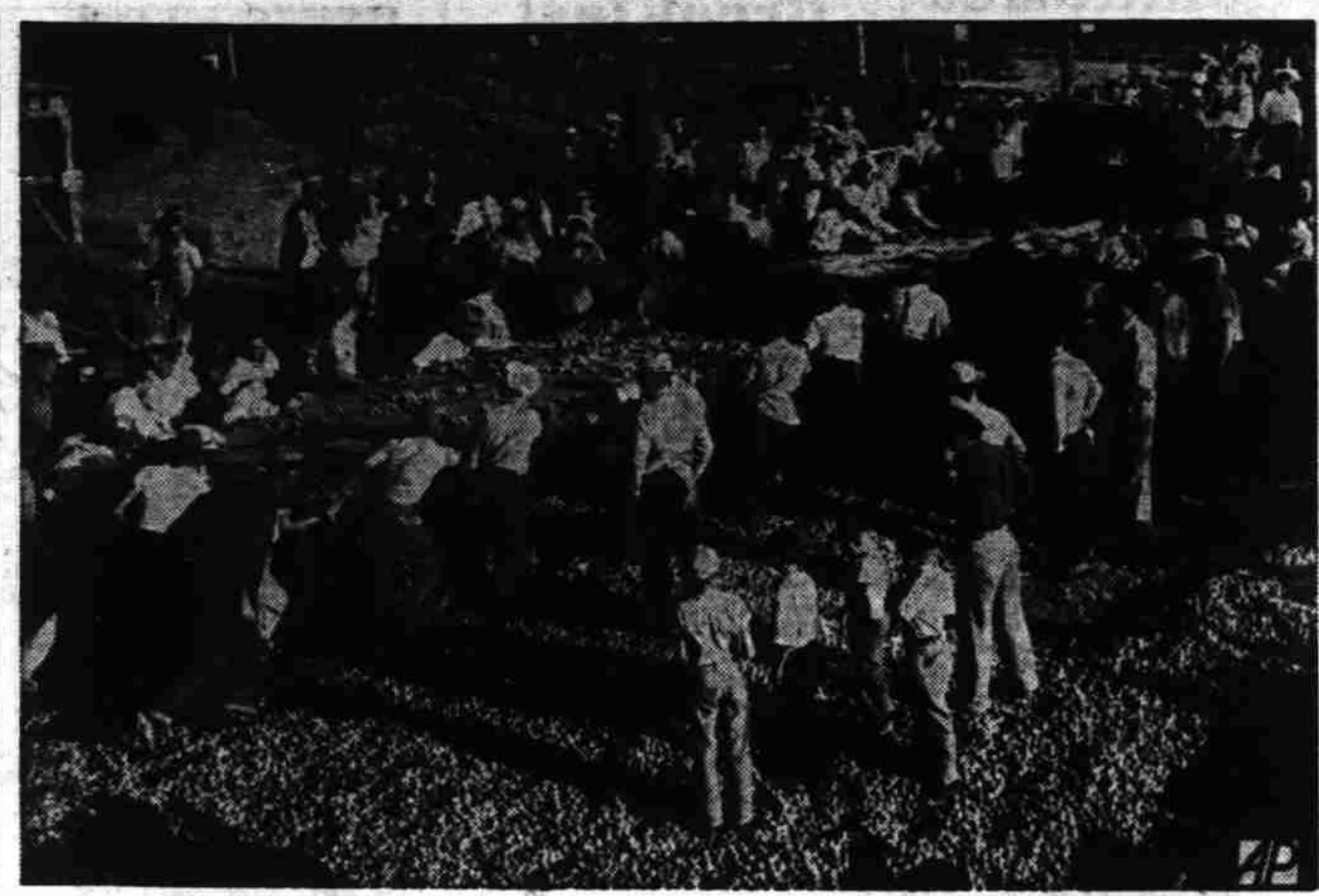
