

Albany Osteopath Hospital Closes

Offices Will Be Retained; Last Rites Are Held for Mrs. Hayne

ALBANY—Closing of the Albany Osteopathic hospital and clinic has been announced by Dr. A. P. Howells. The hospital was opened some eight years ago by Dr. Howells and the late Dr. Edward Viereck, and occupied the entire second floor of the Albany abstract building at Third and Broadbabin streets. Dr. Howells is moving his office to the McDowell building on First street. He is retaining all of his X-ray equipment.

ALBANY—Funeral services for Mrs. U. G. Haynes, 72, who died at the Albany general hospital Monday, were held Wednesday afternoon from the Fort-miller chapel. Rev. J. O. McDonald, of the United Presbyterian church, officiated.

Rhoda Alice Hall was born November 10, 1866, near Jefferson, the daughter of Rev. George Washington Hall, a Baptist minister. Her father died when she was but three years of age, and when she was 15 her mother passed away. She kept house for her sister and three brothers, in the meantime also attending school.

Later she became an assistant missionary at the Warm Springs reservation, followed by the position of matron at the Grand Ronde Indian school, and still later served at Indian schools at Yakima, Wash., and Blackfoot, Mont.

On June 21, 1899, she was married to U. G. Hayne in Portland. To this union three sons were born, two of whom are living. Mrs. Haynes was active member of the United Presbyterian church and the WCTU. Surviving are the widower and two sons, Paul F. and Donald. The latter is fire chief at Albany.
