Parole Publicity Will Be Limited

The new state parole board, meeting here Wednesday, went on record discouraging publication of names of penitentiary inmates paroled for minor offenses.

The argument was advanced that publication of these names would lessen the chances of convicts obtaining employment after leaving the institution. The board announced that no more applications were being received in connection with the appointment of four field parole officers. Approximately 250 applications were received for these four jobs.

The board will meet at the state penitentiary today when a number of prison cases will be considered.

Eastern Oregon's Power Rates Cut

The Eastern Oregon Light and Power company, effective August 1, will pass on to 7000 customers a saving of approximately \$30,000 annually, Ormond R. Bean, state utilities commissioner announced Wednesday.

The new rates will effect residential, commercial lighting and water heating schedules. The company serves 15 cities and communities in Baker, Union and Grant counties.

State Is Extolled For Wildlife Care

Oregon leads the nation in promoting research in connection with wildlife conservation, and is second in number of restoration projects, members of the Salem Rotary club were advised by Carl Shoemaker, secretary of the National Wildlife Federation, at their luncheon Wednesday noon.

State college, game commission and federal funds in the amount of \$18,000 annually are being spent in employing technical and research men, Shoemaker explained.

The speaker emphasized the primary importance of improving the environment for game birds and animals in order to increase their number, rather than reducing bag limits and open seasons. In attempting to get back onto the highway, she struck the front end of a Hudson sedan driven by Mrs. Nelson Bossing of Minneapolis, Minn. In trying to avoid the other car, Mrs. Bossing put on the brakes of her car suddenly and caused a Greyhound bus traveling behind to hit the rear end of the car.

Mrs. Trumph sustained internal injuries and was taken to the Albany hospital. Mrs. Bossing received a sprained ankle.

In the Bossing car were Miss Shuett, statistician from Chicago, and Mrs. Karl Onthank of Eugene. Miss Shuett received cuts and bruises, but Mrs. Onthank was uninjured.

Mrs. Bossing, formerly of Eugene, where her husband was professor of education at the University of Oregon, is visiting in Oregon while her sons are at Camp Lucky Boy, Boy Scout camp on the MacKenzie river.

Eastern Oregon Juice Rate Cut

7000 Customers of Firm to Save \$30,000 per Year on Power

Effective August 1, the Eastern Oregon Light and Power company will pass on to 7000 customers a savings total of almost \$30,000 annually. New rates filed with the state utilities commissioner's office here will effect residential, commercial lighting and water heating schedules.

This information was given out Wednesday by Utilities Commissioner Bean following conference with LeRoy A. Grettum, vice president and general manager of the company.

These reductions are in line with the announcement last week that the Idaho Power company is reducing rates to Ontario, Nyssa and other points in far eastern Oregon and western Idaho. The Eastern Oregon company's headquarters are in Baker. Grettum

The savings announced as effective August 7 are the result of many conferences between the commissioner's offices and the company officials.

Two years ago the concern reduced its rates in the residential, commercial and power brackets by \$22,700 annually. So with the coming reduction it will have made savings to its customers of \$52,300 annually in the past two years. The company paid taxes in 1935 of \$100,891 or 15.8 per cent of its gross revenues. Taxes this year have increased approximately \$14,000, a 14 per cent increase over last year. This increase totals almost \$1.50 per year for every meter in the company's service, said Grettum.

The Eastern Oregon Light & Power company serves 15 cities and communities in Baker, Union and Grant counties.

Ira Darby Files For Water Chief

Ira L. Darby, present office manager of the Salem municipal water department, revealed yesterday that he had filed a formal application with the city water commissioner for the position of manager of the department formerly occupied by the late Cuyler Van Patten.

Darby's formal application does not change the lineup of 13 applicants for the post already indicated by Water Commissioner Chairman I. M. Doughton.

Along with the other 12, his candidacy will probably receive the consideration of the water commission at its regular meeting Friday night, though it is understood that no appointment to the post is to be expected before the end of the month. Other business which the commission will transact will be of a routine character, according to Chairman Doughton. A request by the city schools for block reading of water meters will be one item for the consideration of the commission.

State Automobile Insurance Signed

Dooly & Company, Portland, representing the United States Guaranty company, Wednesday received the contract for providing insurance covering Oregon's fleet of approximately 2000 pieces of automotive equipment.

Awarding of the contract was announced by the state board of control.

The premium totals approximately \$22,651.68 a year and was based on approximately \$13.98 per motor vehicle.

The insurance covers \$10,000 to \$40,000 public liability and \$5000 property damage.

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
