

Stayton Gets \$9770 WPA Improvement

City Streets Will Benefit

Water Situation Is Given Discussion by City Council Session

STAYTON — According to a telegram from Senator Rufus Holman a \$9770 WPA project for Stayton has been approved. Work will start within the next two weeks.

The work will include repairing of streets and sidewalks, posts and traffic signs for all streets in the city, and several streets in the west end of town are to be repaired and finished.

A discussion of Stayton's water situation was held at the regular council meeting. Some of those who have water meters think they are taxed unfairly whereas those who do not yet have meters can use as much water as they want without additional charge. Several council members expressed opinions that having meters was the only equitable way to handle the situation, but that meters could not all be installed at once because of the cost.

Meters Held Way
Other members did not favor meters because they thought that lawns and residential grounds in the city would suffer.

According to J. L. Henderson, city engineer of Vancouver, Wash., Stayton's water supply is adequate and the distribution system will care for the present water needs. He stated that the weak points in the system are the complete lack of storage and outmoded pumps for getting the water through the distributing system.

He also stated that the power is now sufficient for 1448 gallons of water per minute, and this, with a 50,000-gallon elevated storage tank to balance pressure, would give sufficient water supply for domestic use and greatly augment fire hydrant supply.

The council passed an emergency ordinance giving them authority to purchase a different kind of house numbers than was originally planned.

Signs Install
