Corn Strikes Six Year Low

Selling Causes 3c Losses; Wheat Follows Trend to 1939 Bottom

CHICAGO, July 20.-(AP)-Selling poured into the grain pits today, tumbling corn to the lowest levels since 1933 and wheat to net lows for the year.

Corn lost as much as 3 cents a bushel, July contracts breaking to 39%. Wheat dropped as much as 2% cents, with July at 63%. lowest since early last winter September and December contracts were at new lows for the

Selling that engulfed all pits was augmented by heavy offerings on stop loss orders which were brought into execution as prices receded. There were no outstanding trade developments upon which pit brokers could blame liquidation of such volume. They pointed out the bearish domestic situation in corn and the bearish world wheat position had undermined confidence of buyers. Some traders asserted inability of the market to derive recovery power from the price supporting features of the government loan program had disappointed many dealers. Wheat closed 1% - 2% cents

not the first to discover boron's value as fertilizer, they were the first to extend it to new uses. Dr. Powers said cost of commercial borax was about three or four cents a pound wholesale and 30 pounds to the acre produced "excellent results."

Borax has cured alfalfa yellow top in northwestern Oregon and trebled the yield in dry weather cuttings. Beet canker, which caused abandonment of many fields two years ago, was controlled for the first time last season. Borax cured celery stem crack-

ing. It was omitted by one grower who doubted its value. When cracks appeared he applied it in time to preserve high quality celery hearts for market.
