ILA Organizer Declares Bridges Communist at Hearing

thought it was just a little war between him and his wife. They got those peevish, you know." He added:

"It was common knowledge on the waterfront that Bridges sent his wife to the country while he had women shake down his house looking for that book."

Book Story Built

Bridges' Position

Also on direct examination Dietrich asserted Bridges built himself up on the 1934 coast-wide maritime strike by a story that was circulated on the waterfront that he had turned down \$50,000 to "sell out the union."

Dietrich said the story was "ridiculous—but consequently Little Boy Blue here (noddling slightly toward Bridges) was a big shot."

On cross-examination Dietrich admitted he had been given a bad conduct discharge from the navy; had been arrested for drunken driving on the Mexican border and paid a fine of \$50 under protest; and had been a plaintiff in two lawsuits against Bridges and the ILWU.

At the start of today's session, defense attorneys requested a subpoena for Wayne L. Morse, dean of the University of Oregon law school and arbitrator of the Pacific coast longshore contract, to testify as a character witness for Bridges.

The application said Morse's testimony would "show that Harry Bridges is a man whose integrity and character are such that he is to be believed when testifying under oath."

Bridges has repeatedly denied that he now is or ever was a member of the communist party.

ed on its trip north from Seattle, ran aground.

The report to the coast guard said "ship said to be full of water."

The Pandora expedition, seeking to be the first ever to travel around North America, west to east, is headed by Dr. Homer Kelms, 45-year-old farmer and evangelist from Delaware county, Oklahoma.

Others aboard the boat are his daughter, Vivienne, 21, University of Oklahoma coed; Ira Jones, 21, salesman, Springfield, Ark.; engineer; Leo Clark, Bartlesville, Okla., radio operator; A. Y. Owen, Oklahoma City photographer; Cecil I. Brooks, Oklahoma City, business manager.

The Pandora had previously stopped at British Columbia points and at Kotichikan and Juneau, Alaska, on the trip north. Long delayed in its start from Seattle, the expedition already was far behind schedule. Dr. Kelms had said the Pandora should reach Point Barrow, northernmost tip of Alaska, by this week to be assured of getting through the Arctic before the ice closes in.

The motor used during the cruise today was supplied by "Chief Engineer" Onas Olson, who has assisted the troop in problems of seamanship. It will be discarded when the "Williamette" reaches Portland, since both motor and room to stow it will be available there on the broader reaches of the river, and will permit the boat to make way with its own canvas, of which it carries 356 square feet. The craft will be in Portland for the remainder of the summer to serve as a training ship for the local scouts.

The "Williamette" was on display to the public at the foot of Chemeketa street yesterday afternoon prior to leaving Salem.

Smuggling Charge Dropped by Judge

PORTLAND, July 21.—(P)—Albert Formentor, former chief machinist on the Philippine steamer Don Jose, was freed today of a federal opium importing charge when Federal Judge James A. Fee dismissed an indictment.

The dismissal closed the case growing out of seizure by customs agents last September of \$72,000 worth of opium. Pedro Delea, chief engineer of the steamer, and Jose Clemente, third engineer, were found innocent of smuggling charges.

Peak in Southern Oregon To Be Named Jack London

As Coast Guard Plane Sank With Three Aboard



A few minutes after this dramatic rescue picture was taken, a coast guard plane sank with three men aboard following an ocean crash while on a "mercy flight." The plane, a hospital ship, was carrying a sailor stricken with pneumonia to shore when it plunged into the ocean. The sailor and two crew members died. Five others were rescued by the crew of the hatch, Atlanta, from which the sick man was taken a few minutes before the tragedy.

5000 Californians Fight Forest Fire

SAN FRANCISCO, July 21.—(P)—More than 5000 men, aided by airplanes and radios, fought forest fires in California today.

The list of serious fires included one which cut off telephone communications and menaced the hamlet of Gold Run in Placer county, and another which early this evening was sweeping through commercial timber in the Sierra national forest.

The state forestry office reported three buildings at Gold Run were destroyed, telephone wires were down, and the blaze was spreading toward Dutch Flats. Traffic on highway 40 was halted for a time near Gold Run.

A fire burned along both sides of the San Joaquin river in the Sierra national forest, 50 miles east of Fresno. Six thousand acres, including 600 acres of commercial cedar and sugar pine were blackened in this area. Five hundred men fought it, aided by airplanes which reconnoitered the rough area and reported by radio to headquarters.

Another large fire area was in Tehama county, near Paynes creek.

Another fire swept through 5000 acres of brush and timber in the Lassen national forest.

Senator Asks Cut In Harbors Funds

Columbia River Projects Would Be Eliminated if Move Made

WASHINGTON, July 21.—(P)—Chairman Bailey (D-NC) declared today he would ask the senate commerce committee to eliminate from the omnibus authorization bill for rivers and harbors all projects estimated to cost more than \$10,000,000.

Bailey recited his committee increased the house-approved authorization from \$53,848,100 to \$407,855,600.

"This has weighed the bill down," he wrote, "and there is no possibility of its passage in its present state. Even if it should pass, the president would veto it, according to my information. One of the senators told me this morning that Senator Barkley (the majority leader) was unwilling for the bill to be considered as it is."

In addition to the big projects, Bailey said he would propose striking out all flood control developments. He said he was preparing a substitute bill for consideration by the committee.

Among projects involving more than \$10,000,000 were Columbia river, Oregon, and Washington, \$23,700,000.

Elderly Silverton Woman Unlocated

SILVERTON—Mrs. Miles Barber, 74, had not returned to her home at 411 First street here Friday night after she apparently arose early Friday morning while her husband was still sleeping and left. Barber, who is 80 years old, believes she may be on her way to Lansing, Mich., to see a son.

Inquiry brought out that Mrs. Barber went to Salem with a mail carrier at 7 o'clock and that she had taken a bus out of Salem.

Barber, who appeared unworried, said his wife "had never liked Oregon." They were remarried two years ago after a 22 year separation.

Abductor of Babe Sentenced to Jail

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 21.—(P)—Maurice S. Lies, 20, who confessed he abducted the 18-month-old child of Mrs. Alice Winston, 21, hoping to force her to marry him, was given a 30-day suspended sentence in justice court today. He was charged with disorderly conduct.

The mother, similarly charged, also was given a suspended sentence. The child was returned unhurt.

Buchman Declares New Force Needed

MONTEREY, Calif., July 21.—(P)—"We need a whole new world force" to avert war, Dr. Frank Buchman, Oxford group founder, told interviewers when he arrived in Monterey for the opening tonight of the second world assembly for moral rearmament.

"We also need a whole new world order," he said, "A new understanding of man with man, labor with capital, class with class. The answer is moral re-armament."

Fifteen hundred persons were expected to attend the assembly, which continues through July 31.

They're Still Doing It; He Saved Limb He Sat on

Critser, limb and tree fell into a ditch. The man suffered leg and internal injuries.

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Parole Men Will Be Chosen Today

Appointment of four field parole officers under the new 1939 state parole law will be announced today, Fred Finsley, state parole director, declared Friday afternoon.

Finsley said the new parole board received more than 30 applications for the four field parole jobs. All of these applicants were interviewed by Finsley.

Appointment of these officers will complete the state parole board organization. Irl Mesberry recently was named deputy parole director.

The new parole board fixes the minimum sentences of prisoners while the maximum terms are fixed by the courts.

Perishes of Heat While Spring Near

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif., July 21.—(P)—With a gushing desert spring only half a mile away, William L. Hyatt, 62, a mine employe, perished of heat and thirst when his automobile broke down, Coroner R. E. Williams said today.

His body was found on the desert 40 miles north of Baker yesterday by two miners, after they discovered his abandoned car.

Coroner Williams said Hyatt abandoned his car when an axle broke as he was en route to the telegraph mine, deep in the desert north of Baker.
