

Portland Asks Arterial Road

Development of Highway on Front Street Is Asked Commission

PORTLAND, July 27.—(P)—The state highway commission heard plans today for early development of an arterial highway along Front avenue, Portland, and awarded three contracts:

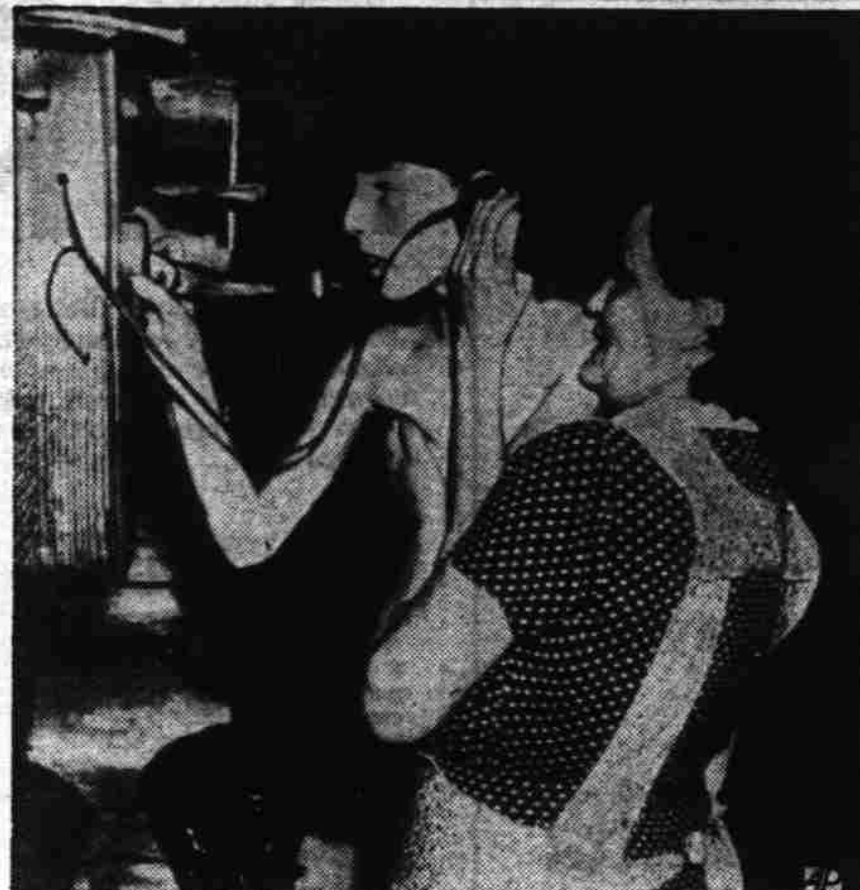
Contracts were:
Hood River county—Grading, surfacing and constructing concrete bridge on .69 of a mile of Warren Creek section, Columbia river highway, E. C. Hall, Co., Eugene, \$47,755.

Lane County—Improving 11.5 miles of roadside on Junction City-Eugene section, Pacific highway, Blair T. Alderman, Eugene, \$9,988.

Multnomah county—Clearing 4.13 miles, grading .6 of a mile and constructing embankment on 1.95-mile east unit Troutdale-Corbett section Columbia river highway, Morrison-Knudsen Co., Boise, Idaho, \$89,930.

Park Areas Bought
The commission purchased 14 parcels of park acreage along the Wolf Creek short-cut to the beaches. The total of 652 acres will be developed as park sites. Cost of

the parcels, between Sunset Camp and Necanicum Junction, was \$19,000.

A temporary speed limit of 25 miles per hour was set on the unfinished Wolf Creek section between Elsie and Necanicum Junction.

Chairman Henry F. Cabell told Mayor Joseph Carson and Chester A. Mores, president of the Metropolitan association, the commission was "eager" to work out

plans for the Front avenue development, but high right-of-way costs were the principal barrier.

Other commission action included: Authorization of highway signs directing tourists to Timberline Lodge on Mt. Hood.

Freighters Meet In Astoria Fog

ASTORIA, Ore., July 27.—(P)—The freighter J. L. Luckenbach was slightly damaged in foggy Astoria harbor today when it veered against the Pacific Exporter.

The Luckenbach's bow fouled the Furness line ship's anchor chain, stopped dead and swung to the side in the current. The Luckenbach's upper port bow plates and port after bulwark were damaged.

The 3999-ton Luckenbach was anchored to await arrival of a Lloyd's agent from Portland. The 4092-ton Exporter, apparently undamaged, sailed for Glasgow.

The Exporter was anchored off pier 3 awaiting a break in the fog before crossing the Columbia river bar. The Luckenbach was out-bound for Seattle.

H. V. Wiegant, deputy US customs collector, who witnessed the collision, said visibility was good and he saw sparks fly when the steel plates scraped.

The fog lifted and permitted several bar-bound ships to get underway.
