Hundreds of Hollywood Film Dummies Thrown out of Work; Extras Fill Job

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Depression has descended upon Hollywood's dummies—to the benefit of hundreds of extras.

In the old days no action picture was complete without a wagon-load of dummies. They were thrown from buildings, dumped into river, run over by trucks and strewn around on battlefields.

But today under guild contracts with most studios, dummies may be used only in scenes involving tremendous risk.

If a studio uses a dummy for work a human being could do, it must pay an extra anyway.

In Samuel Goldwyn's corpse-splinked "The Real Glory" only two dummies were used. They were blown up in a boat.

"There were stunt men willing to sit in the boat when we blew it up," said Director Henry Hathaway.

"But we wouldn't let them. We knew they might get hurt."

Stunt Men Take Dare In river scenes showing "bodies" floating over rapids Hathaway said.

"We can do it," the stunt men said. "We're expert water workers and there is absolutely no danger."

The scenes went through without a hitch.

Scores of extras played dead in the picture for weeks during the filming of battle scenes, Hathaway said.

Two Filipino women spent four weeks lying on their faces on a river bank. Across the river were two men half-submerged.

And beyond them were a good many others sprawled around in the grass, earning \$7.50 a day for not moving a muscle while the camera turned.
