At the Jack DeJong farm a high producing herd will be in-spected. Mr. DeJong has one of the highest herd area of the highest herd averages for butter fat production in the association. At the Dick DeJong farm an up-to-date bull pen will

be observed. A modern milk house arrangement is the main item of interest that will be considered at the Henry Keyt farm. Irrigated pastures and loafing sheds will be the primary consideration at the M. B. Findley and C. J. Jenkins farms.

In order to provide some variety and also some entertainment during the day, arrangements have been made for judging dairy cattle at several of the farms. At the noon hour a special program has been arranged which will feature Charles Smith, field representative of the American Guernsey Cattle club, as the main speaker. Mr. Roger Morse, extension dairyman at Oregon State college, has also been slated on the program.


