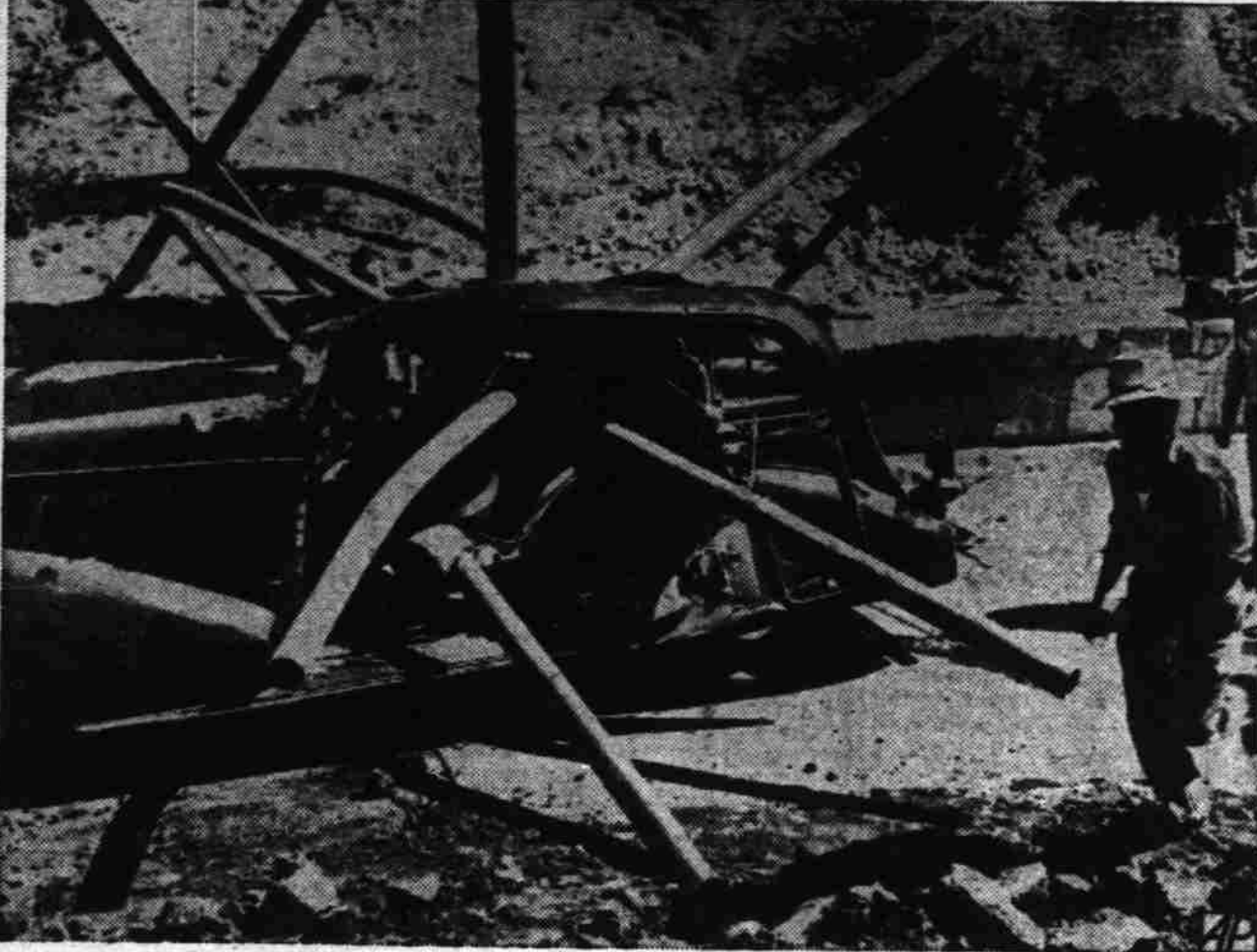

Nut Growers To Make Tour

Annual Association Trip Is Set August 16-17 to Nearby Farms

DALLAS—The annual tour of the Western Nut Growers association has been announced for August 16 and 17 by C. E. Schuster, secretary-treasurer of that organization.

Among farms to be visited will be the Fred Beach farm where different ages of filberts are being grown. On this farm control work on filbert blight and nut worms are being carried on.

The John Thornburg farm tiling and other practices in filbert plantings will be discussed. At Ferd Groner's walnut orchard soil problems will be discussed.

At the Dr. Chandler filbert orchard irrigation will be the main item of interest.

On the second day several other farms will be visited including A. Wolde's. Walnuts will be observed where blight and spraying tests have been in progress. On the C. P. Niebert farm more walnut irrigation will be observed.

In the afternoon the group will first go to William Blake's near Salem where walnuts of all ages can be observed and where a young orchard is being rebuilt after being injured by freezing. This work is being done by budding and grafting. At the McNary and Stolz walnut and filbert orchards inter-plantings of prunes and other tree fruits will be observed.

On the first day the group is to meet at 8:30 a.m. at the court house in Hillsboro, and at 1:30 p.m. at Scholls. On the second day the group is to meet at Aumsville at 9:30 a.m. and at Salem at 1:30 p.m. The group will meet at Salem just north of the Willamette river bridge near the small park.

Lebanon Stations Get Scio Prunes

SCIO—Prunes from growers in this vicinity will be delivered at Lebanon beginning about September 1, according to Ed Rubesh of Scio, secretary of the Scio Fruit and Berry Growers' association.

Rubesh was also in charge of the receiving station at Scio for the cherry and berry season just closed. Rubesh stated that 22,000 crates were delivered at the Morrison warehouse in Scio for the Spencer Packing company of Lebanon. Rubesh stated that 5,000 crates of strawberries brought 5 1/2 cents, raspberries 6 1/2, black-caps 5, Boysenberries 4, young-berries 3, loganberries 3 and cherries 3 1/2. Fruit here totaled more than 37 tons, and brought about \$10,000 to growers here.
