Bonneville Authority Is Requesting County for Easement

The Bonneville authority yes terday sought permission of the Marion county court 's string the Vancouver-Eugene electric power transmission line across 30 county roads. The petition was signed by F. A. Banks, acting Bonneville administrator.

Construction of the line is pro-

gressing so rapidly "it is urgent that we have permission to build over these roads at an early date," Sherwood Jones, chief of the Bon-neville land division, wrote in a letter of transmittal. Restrictions Loose

The court noted that a suggested form of easement, providing among other points for an irrevo. cable right to be vested in the United States government, did not include all of the restrictions which it has been customary to impose on private power compan-
