A one-story brick building and lot on High street near Chemeketa has been transferred from G. W. Paulus to Herbert L. Stiff Furniture company under a real estate transaction announced yesterday. W. H. Grabenhorst & company handled the deal.

The building will be used for warehouse and storage purposes. Mr. Stiff said. He plans to remodel the front of the building into storerooms, although he has not determined the number.

The meeting will be held at the Swegle school.

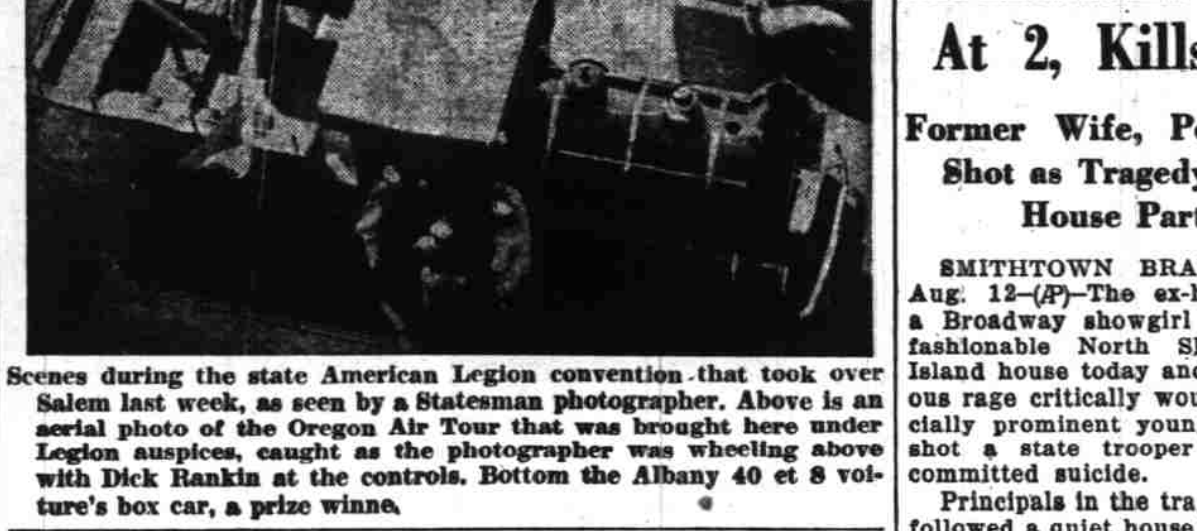

CIQ Asks Quash Of Garnishments

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 12—(AP)—The Congress of Industrial Organizations petitioned today for a court order dissolving garnishments and attachments against approximately 1423 CIO members, the outgrowth of an American Federation of Labor sawmill union suit to recover \$11,269 in cash and property.

The AFL asserted the money and property was kept by former members who bolted to the CIO two years ago. Hearings on the petitions will be held before Circuit Judge James W. Crawford Monday.

FDR Sails off For Vacation

President Aboard Cruiser Will See Sub Salvage Operations

NEW YORK, Aug. 12—(AP)—President Roosevelt, having cleared his desk of all legislation adopted by the recent congress, sailed from New York today aboard the cruiser Tuscaloosa for a vacation in New England and Canadian waters.

Although the president's cruise course was indefinite, he said he expected to put in Monday at Campobello, N. e. w Brunswick, where Mr. and Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, jr., are on vacation. The remainder of a leisurely trip up the Canadian coast, possibly as far as Newfoundland, will depend upon the weather, with the possibility of stopping at Halifax or other ports at night. He planned to return to Washington late in the month, being uncertain where he would embark.

Ex-Husband Fires At 2, Kills Self

Former Wife, Policeman Shot as Tragedy Mars House Party

SMITHTOWN BRANCH, N.Y., Aug. 12—(AP)—The ex-husband of a Broadway showgirl invaded a fashionable North Shore Long Island house today and in a jealous rage critically wounded a socially prominent young divorcee, shot a state trooper and then committed suicide.

Principals in the tragedy which followed a quiet house party were Mrs. Elizabeth Greve Caldwell Carolin, 31, mother of two children and daughter of William Marcus Greve, former New York financier; and Lawrence Sprague, 30, stepson of Dr. Shirley E. Sprague, prominent New York city physician.

For half an hour, after chasing Mrs. Carolin into a bedroom in the home of Mrs. Madelyn Waterman Higgins, Sprague threatened death while Mrs. Carolin waited in terror and Mrs. Higgins, having called the police, vainly tried to save her guest from harm. Mrs. Higgins is the fountain pen fortune heiress and estranged wife of a member of the Higgins ink family.

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Harvey S. Bowen Called by Death

SILVERTON—Harvey S. Bowen, 73, lifetime resident of the Silverton community and member of a prominent pioneer family, died Saturday night at the home of a niece, Mabel Bowen of Bethany. Mr. Bowen was born December 9, 1866. His wife died in 1900 and a brother, G. D. Bowen of Bethany, about two months ago. Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Eva Gove of Corvallis; two sons, Chauncey and Peter, both at home; nephews and nieces, Carl Zimmerman of Silverton, A. W. DeSart of Hollywood, Calif., Merl Bowen of Bethany and Mrs. Mabel Venosky of Portland.

Funeral announcements will be made later by Ekman's mortuary.

First prize winners of the four state fair contests—in dairy products, dairy consumption and cattle judging—will receive a trip to the Golden Gate exposition, and cash awards will go to the next four winners in each contest.

Another innovation this year is the Valley Packing dressed hog carcass contest, awards for which total \$50. This event is designed to teach clubbers the type, weight quality and finish of hogs best suited for markets and to encourage production of this kind.

The junior livestock breeders, including both the 4H and Future Farmers of America, will have entirely new barns this year in which to house their stock.

Future Farmers from eastern Oregon will make their first livestock exhibits at the state fair this year.
