DETROIT, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Three former Tigers plagued their old mates today as the St. Louis Browns clubbed four Detroit hurriers to pull even in the series, 17 to 3.

Pitcher Vernon Kennedy, Chet Laabs and Mark Christman, who went to St. Louis in the deal that gave Buck Newsum to the Browns, practically won the game themselves by producing half the Browns' 16 hits.

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Reds Destroy Cards' Streak

Bucky Walters Wins 20th as National Leaders Win 8 to 4

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 12.—(AP)—The pace-setting Reds of Cincinnati, a bit wobbly of late, steadied themselves today to stop the St. Louis Cardinals' winning streak at 10 straight games and give Bucky Walters a 3 to 4 triumph for his 20th victory of the year. He became the first major league pitcher to reach the 20 mark.

Home runs by Wally Berger and Ernie Lombardi, the latter's coming with two men on base, aided the Reds in taking the first encounter of a "crucial" three-game series with the second place Cardinals. The teams play a double-header tomorrow.

The victory widened the Reds' lead in the National league pennant race to 3½ games.
