"Lady of the Tropics" Is
Newest Story for new
Talked-of Star

Robert Taylor and Hedy Lamarr, the most talked-about woman in motion pictures today, arrive as the newest and most fascinating romantic team of the screen in "Lady of the Tropics," opening today at the Elsinore theatre.

The setting of the story, written especially for the new team by Ben Hecht, takes place in the heart of the Orient, where wanderers of all races, irrespective of caste, meet and mingle, seek love and sometimes die. As the love between Taylor and Miss Lamarr progresses, it takes them to the colorful harbor of Saigon, the "Paris of the East," along its teeming river docks, into the interesting quarters of the natives, their cafes and shops.

Settings Faithful
Settings faithful to the country also include the more fashionable cafes, hotels and government buildings where mixed society meets, from whence the interest for each other ripens within the mystifying ruins of the great enigmatic temple of Angkor Wat, shrine of a forgotten race only recently torn out of the jungle by French explorers.

Taylor plays young Bill Carey, penniless American, who meets and falls in love with Manon, a beautiful half-caste, portrayed by Miss Lamarr, whose dream is to flee from Indo-China where no one recognizes her, and become a white woman.

The picture has caught the full flavor of Twain's whimsical humor and deep understanding of human kind. The adventures of the river boy who aids a runaway slave in an attempt to reach a free state; their travels up the river on a raft; their adventures with the rascally "King" and "Duke," a pair of crooks, are all faithfully portrayed under the deft direction of Richard Thorpe.

The ranking comedy highlight is the absurd "Romeo and Juliet" performance with Walter Connolly as Romeo and Mickey, in girl's clothes and make-up, as Juliet. Dramatic highlights are his exposure of the crooks to save Lynne Carver and Jo Ann Sayers, playing helpresses, from being robbed, and the sequence where Rex Ingram, as the slave, carries the boy, bitten by a snake, back to medical aid, knowing it means his return to slavery.

The scenes, filmed on location along the Sacramento river, are beautifully picturesque. The picture follows the book with absolute fidelity.

Slovakians Stage Anti-Jewish Riot

BRATISLAVA, Slovakia, Aug. 12—(AP)—A crowd of youths, for the second successive night, staged anti-Jewish demonstrations here tonight, beating up in the streets everyone they encountered who resembled a Jew.

The mob activities followed an attack last night on two synagogues and the beating of Jews in public cafes. Police reinforcements were placed on duty in Bratislava's ghetto following these demonstrations. Tonight the youths rushed through the streets and forced their way into a Jewish club where they smashed furniture and man-handled guests. Jews were driven into the streets from several cafes. Police finally appeared and dispersed the mob.

Four Are Injured As Car Overturns

ENTERPRISE, Aug. 12—(AP)—Mrs. E. Morris, Enterprise, was critically injured and three others slightly injured today when a car driven by Harold E. Anderson, Portland, overturned on a sharp curve nine miles north of here. Mrs. Morris suffered a broken neck and arm and skull fracture. What is hailed as one of the most unusual stories ever told on the screen is "Five Came Back," featured today at the Capitol theatre with an all-star cast which includes Chester Morris, Lucille Ball, Wendy Barrie, John Carradine, Allen Jenkins, Joseph Calleia, C. Aubrey Smith, Kent Taylor, Patric Knowles and Elisabeth Risdon.

The absorbing plot deals with the grim experiences of a group of airplane passengers and pilots forced down in the Brazilian jungle by a tropical storm, and fighting a desperate race against time

MacDonald Stars At State Theatre

Tuneful Thrills Booked,
"Broadway Serenade"
Opening Today

Packed with musical, romantic and eye-filling thrills, "Broadway Serenade," starring Jeanette MacDonald opens today at the State theatre.

Unlike most films in the musical category, this one contains a story which holds interest from the first scene until the fadeout. In brief, it is the tale of a young married couple, she a singer, he a composer-pianist. As a team they play most of New York's cheap night clubs until a lucky break starts the girl climbing high on the ladder of musical-comedy success. The boy is left behind to battle for recognition as a composer and to master the jealousy which eventually breaks up the marriage. The story moves in two extremes of locale, the glittering show-world of which the girl becomes a part and the garret-room where her husband is struggling to bring himself a success of which she may be proud.

Seldom has Jeanette MacDonald had a better opportunity for both her dramatic and vocal abilities. For the first time since "San Francisco" she carries the vocal honors singly. Her songs have been wisely selected to please diversified audiences. There are favorites of the Gay Nineties, grand opera selections, and a dash of the day's hit tunes.

Lew Ayres, as Miss MacDonald's composer-pianist husband, gets his best role to date. He is ideally suited for the part and turns in an outstanding performance.
