September 21 Is Date of Beginning Classes at College Here

With September 21 set as the date for the beginning of classes, preparations for the opening of the fall semester at Willamette university are nearing completion. September 13 and 19 have been designated as freshman days for freshman orientation, examinations and registration. Upper class registration will take place on September 20.

The first semester will close with exam week which starts January 22, and the second semester will open January 23. Commencement has been set for June 8.
Major changes in building during the summer have been the construction of class rooms in the basement of Waller hall in the space vacated by the law library and remodeling of office rooms in Eaton hall. Several rooms, including the dining hall, of Lausanne hall have been redecorated, and Science hall has been reclaimed.

Completion of the faculty list awaits the announcement of the selection of a new dean for the law school.
