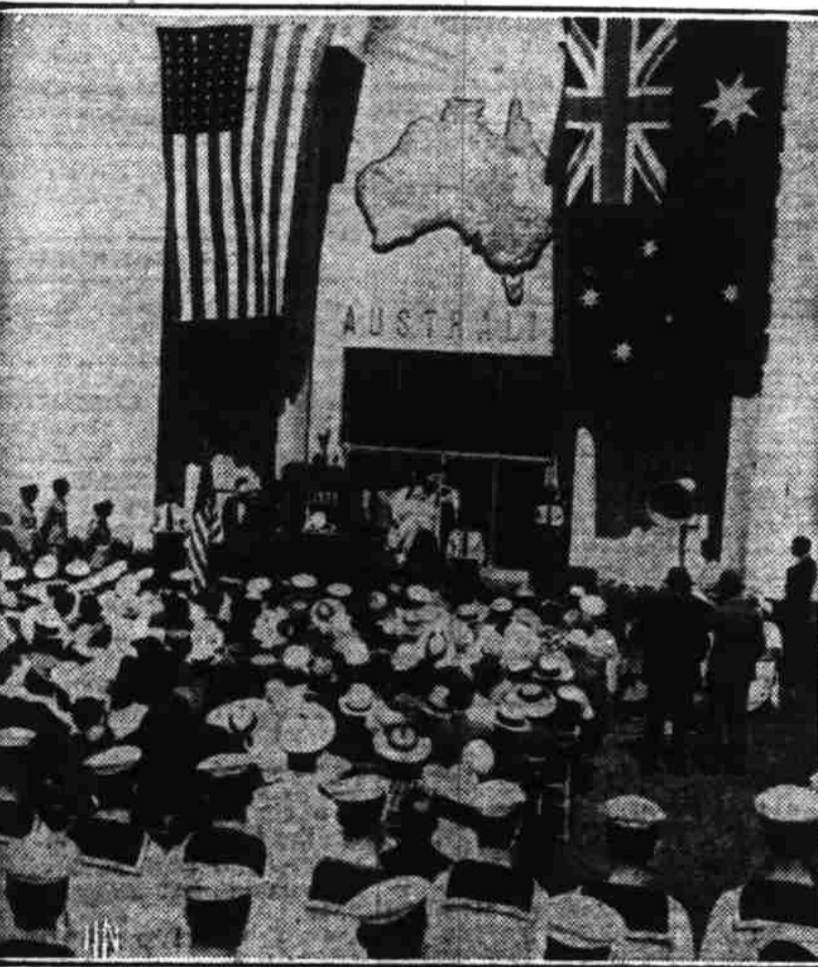


How "L" train crashed into tower

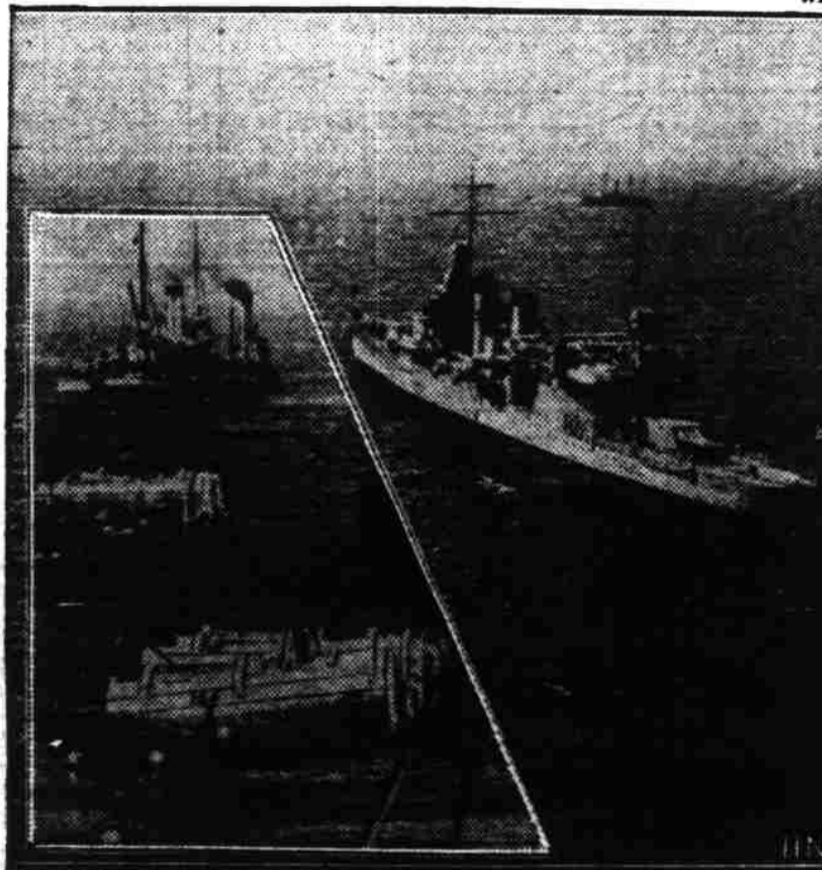

H., with a death toll of 24. The Tuscaloosa is shown at right. Inset is a closeup of the pontoons dragging the Squidus off the sea floor. Operations were temporarily stalled when she stuck fast in the mud after being lifted 80 feet off the ocean floor.

Claiming his conscience bothered him, Louis Frey, 27, of Hamilton, O., surrendered to Manteca, Cal., police in connection with the shooting of a taxi driver at Hamilton, July 10.



These four criminals were named by the FBI as the nation's top public enemies. Enemy No. 1 is Irving Charles Chapman, escaped Texas bank robber, under 145-year sentence. No. 2 is Theodore Cole, 27, kidnaper who escaped from Alcatraz Federal prison in 1937 with No. 3, Ralph Roe, 33, a bank robber. No. 4 is Louis (Lepke) Buchalter, 42, wanted in New York for conspiracy and extortion. A \$30,000 reward is offered for Buchalter, dead or alive.
