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nation would receive generous offers of Poland for her true friendship to Germany.

Hungary was frightened. An anti-bolshevik country whose beloved regent, Admiral Nicolas Horthy, smashed a communist government to come to power, Hungary feared the effect of the combined Nazi doctrine of Germany and the communist creed of Russia on her society.

Rumania cabinet members, including Foreign Minister Grigore Gafencu, were up half the night. Their countrymen remembered they held Bessarabia, a territory secured from Russia, after the World War, and held other territory desired by Hungary and Bulgaria.

Bulgaria, including many government officials, hailed an announcement of the coming pact. Bulgaria has been divided between those favoring Germany and those favoring "Father Ivan" as Russia is called.

It was said that Bulgarians could now get together with the Nazis and the communists joining hands. Vision of quick recovery of territory from Rumania were before Bulgarian eyes.

Yugoslavia, an anti-bolshevik country, whose court harbors many white Russians, was stunned by the news. Pessimistic officials could see little future for Yugoslavia except to "kneel under."

Funeral services will be held Tuesday at 2 p. m. in the ME church in Monroe. Interment will follow in the family plot in the Monroe cemetery.

Murder Charged Slayer of Nurse

Brumfield Is Being Held in City Jail Hospital After Escape Try

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 21—(P)—Allen Brumfield, 24, escaped Washington penitentiary convict, was charged with first-degree murder in a complaint issued today by Deputy District Attorney Sidney Hayes.

Brumfield shot and killed Mrs. Hattie Hooker, 60, hospital attendant, in an attempted escape Saturday from Good Samaritan hospital, where he was under police guard, the complaint charges.

His escape try was thwarted when Patrolman Sam C. Worrell shot him in the base of the skull. He is being held in the city jail hospital.

Patrolman Worrell and Dr. C. H. Manlove, hospital supervisor, were slightly wounded.

Brumfield was in the hospital for treatment of a gun wound inflicted by police early last week.

Internal Revenue Drops Claim for \$53,682,000

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20—(P)—In the largest tax settlement of its kind on record, the internal revenue bureau today formally relinquished claim to \$53,682,000 in taxes levied against the Associated Gas and Electric system.

Under the agreement previously announced, the system will pay the government \$8,700,000.

Voting Is Set For Hopgrower

Industry to Decide Upon Amendments Plan for Market Agreement

Hop growers will vote in a referendum between August 21 and September 2 on proposed amendments to the order supplementing the marketing agreement now in effect which regulates the handling of hops produced in Oregon, California and Washington, according to an announcement received by the Salem office of the hop control board yesterday from the division of marketing and marketing agreements of the AAA.

The amendments, tentatively approved by the secretary of agriculture, were proposed by the hop control board which administers the marketing agreement program. Under the program each year the salable quantity of hops is established and is allotted proportionately among all growers, based on the quantity of hops produced by each grower.

The principal amendments as tentatively approved follow:

1. Redefine the term "grower-dealer" so as to exclude from this classification growers who handle only hops of their own production;
2. Make applicable to 1938 crop of hops the 1939 allotment certificate of a grower if such grower's 1939 production does not equal his 1938 allotment;
3. Permit a grower to purchase from another grower uncertificated hops in a quantity equal to the difference between the purchasing grower's production and his allotment;
4. Prevent substitution of uncertificated hops to the extent of insurance collected for the hops within a grower's salable allotment which have been destroyed or damaged;
5. Grant certain exemptions for hops under contracts made by a grower before June 14, 1938, in order that grower may deliver hops produced by himself to fill the contracts.

The amendments may be made effective by the secretary if two-thirds of the growers who vote in the referendum by number or by volume of hops produced favor the change and if handlers of at least 50 per cent of the hops shipped in interstate or foreign commerce sign the agreement.

Mother and two Children Drive out Of Flaming Forest From Cabin Deep In Remote Trask River Fire Region

A tale of a mother who drove with her two young daughters through the Trask river forest fires that flared up in Tillamook county Saturday was brought to Salem Sunday when she stopped at the Statesman office to inquire concerning the safety of her husband, Wayne Satterlee, a forest service mechanic.

Mrs. Satterlee and her daughters, Norma, 4, and Belva, 4, were warned at 2 p. m. Saturday to vacate their cottage, most remotely located residence on the Trask river. Their personal belongings hurriedly packed into their automobile, they set out for Tillamook through fire-dotted timber, with smoke so dense the road was visible for only a few feet ahead at a time.

The 14-mile trip out of the fire area took more than an hour's time. Burning houses, flaming trees and falling embers were passed along the way, and scores of animals, presumably farm cattle, rushed pell-mell along the road, Mrs. Satterlee said.

She and her two girls took haven at the Adam Hartman residence at 1 1/2 miles. Her husband formerly lived in Salem. More than 100 telephone inquiries concerning the fall of smoke which the Tillamook blazes laid over Salem were answered by the Statesman office between 3 and 6 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

Deputies Battle Combing Strikers

SOUTH ZARE, Mass., Aug. 21.—(P)—Twenty deputy sheriffs waving night sticks clashed for an hour with a milling throng of approximately 400 men and women outside the struck plant of the Barre Wool Combing company tonight while trying to form a lane for employees wishing to go to work.

Except for bruises and bumps suffered as the participants pushed, hauled and tugged, there were no injuries.

The officers expressed fear further trouble might develop when the 25 who gained admittance to the plant attempted to leave at 3 a. m. (PST tomorrow).

Shirtsleeve Rule Of Judge on hot Day Is Welcomed

SAVANNAH, Ga., Aug. 21.—(P)—Attorneys and court attendants were startled today when Federal District Judge William H. Barrett ascended the bench in shirtsleeves instead of the customary black robe.

Their surprise turned to amusement when he smiled and said: "Gentlemen, you may all take off your coats if you like."

Half a dozen lawyers accepted the invitation. While all said later they knew of no precedent for a coatless session of the federal court, they concurred heartily in the "ruling."

Tug's Crew Saved When Boat Burns

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Aug. 21.—(P)—Three crew members of the tug Vulcan, owned by the Luke-Nicholas company, White Salmon, Wash., were rescued today when the boat burned in the Columbia river near Cascade Locks.

Captain Jack Frederick, Les Egan and Dell Nichols were taken off by the tug Mystic. The Vulcan was towed to shore but burned to the waterline.

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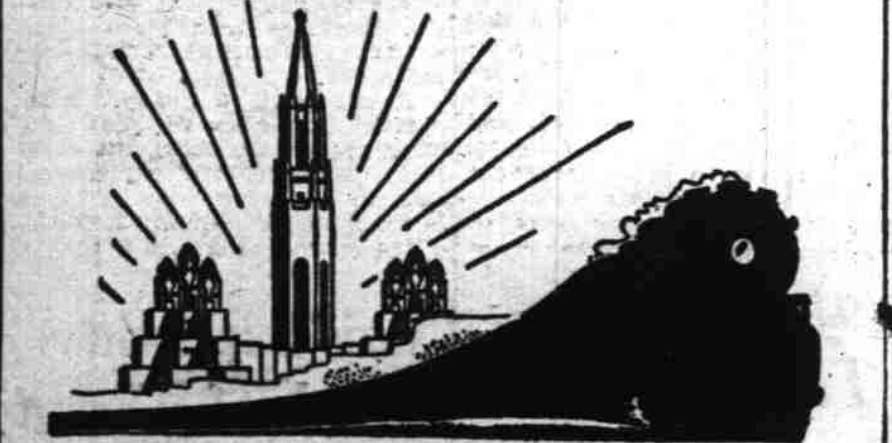

Loans of 63 1/2 cents to 65 cents a bushel may be arranged now at the county agent's office in the postoffice building. Loans will run until April 30. Interest charge is four per cent.
