

Council Stops Water Project

Attempt to Improve Scio System Halted by City Officials

SCIO—Final on city water system improvements was declared by the Scio city council this week when majority vote decreed that the Eugene Ruedy company, Portland contractors, be permitted to halt work on the federally-aided waterworks project.

Following a special bond election about a year ago, the council arranged for the expenditure of approximately \$20,000, if necessary, in improving the inadequate water system at Scio. Completion of the project is long overdue, but repeated extensions have been granted by the council, which apparently finally became irked at continued delays.

The bone of contention on which members of the council have been sharply divided was the new drilled well in South Scio. Depth of 350 feet was reported by the driller when tools were lost several weeks ago. Since that time there has been little harmony between members of the council on the one hand, and the project engineer and the contractor on the other.

The new well tested about 125 gallons per minute a few days ago, it was stated by a council member, whereas the council had hoped for at least twice that amount of water to augment the city well in North Scio drilled several years ago. Talk of a new well on the north side is reported, but not with government financial assistance, it was said.

The new south side well represents something like \$2000 in its present forced completion. It is not definitely known whether the scant flow will justify pumping at considerable electric power expense.

The pros out-voted the cons three to two Monday night on a motion to wind up the deal with Ruedy. Councilmen Bartu, Cyrus and Roadarmel voted to stop the project while Bryan and Withers voted in the negative. Councilman Sims, who had usually aligned himself with the Bryan-Withers group, did not attend the meeting.
