

Nearly a Thousand See Recreation Area at Annual Open House

Park Service, YMCA Hosts

Guides Show 4 Camping Units, 51 Buildings, Swimming Pool

SILVER FALLS STATE PARK—Approximately 1,200 visitors viewed the Silver Creek recreational area Sunday afternoon between 1 and 5 o'clock during the area's annual open house.

The national park service and the Salem YMCA were joint hosts. Harry Buckley, project manager for the park service and David E. Thompson, landscape architect, explained the recreational area and greeted guests at the recreation hall. Assisting as hosts for the day were Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Kells, Fred Smith, Mr. and Mrs. Gus Moore and Bernice Humphreys from the YMCA of Salem.

From 3:30 until 4:30 refreshments were served in the dining hall.

Camp leaders, serving as guides took the visitors to see the four camping units now completed, the campfire circle, the swimming pool, the recreational hall, craft building, infirmary, show and administration buildings. There are now 51 buildings in the area, 19 new ones having been completed this summer.

Plan Enlargement—Guides explained that one organized camp is now available for use and another is under construction. The camp is planned so that it can be used simultaneously by boys and girls. Immediate plans for additional development of the area is contemplated for two additional organized camps and a day-use area for the general public.

The first organized camp which accommodates 84 persons is equipped with complete water and sanitary system.

The organized camping facilities are available for use, it was said, by permit to public, semi-public and private non-profit organizations, on a seasonal or short term basis.

Stayton Budget Shows Decrease

STAYTON—At a meeting of the Stayton city council recently a tentative budget was approved by the budget committee. It showed a decrease of \$300 in comparison to the last budget. It called for \$11,596.

The decrease in the budget was accounted for mostly by the increased receipts in the water department.

New expenses, which have been added are \$180 for a police patrol car, \$85 for insurance and officers' bonds, and \$240 for the salary of the superintendent of the water department.

The general fund received an increase of \$400 in the budget, but other increases were small with some remaining the same as last year and others lower than last year.

There will be another meeting of the budget committee and the council before it goes before the citizens sometime in October.
