Maaske Assumes La Grande Post
Ex-Salem Educator Goes to Eastern Normal Presidency

Dr. Roben J. Maaske, an educator stationed in Salem from 1931 to 1936, today will assume the presidency of Eastern Oregon college of education at La Grande. Before coming to Salem, Dr. Maaske served school principalships at Ewing, Neb., and Irriagon, Ore., and from 1929 to 1931 was a supervisor in the Portland public schools. He came to Salem in 1931 as deputy state superintendent of public instruction until 1936, when he completed study for his master of arts degree at University of Oregon. He studied at the University of Minnesota in 1936 and 1937 and received his doctorate there in 1938. Dr. Maaske has served as professor of school administration at the University of North Carolina for the past two years and also as editor of The High School Journal.

Probate Lists Large Estates

VanPatten Holdings Set at \$47,866; Large Estate Admitted

Appraised value of \$47,866.74 was placed on the estate of the late Cuyler VanPatten, first manager of the Salem water department, in a report filed in probate yesterday by Frank N. Derby, Ira L. Darby and Chandler P. Brown. Principal property belonging to the Van Patten estate was listed as the 112 by 54 foot parcel of lot 4, block 5, Salem, on which the Plaza apartments building, erected by VanPatten, stands. Its value was set at \$44,937.50. The remainder of the estate was shown to consist principally of notes and stocks.

The \$37,900 estate of the late Felix LaBranch was admitted to probate yesterday and Alfred E. LaBranch, son, named executor. The appraisal will be made by Gene Grabenhorst, O. E. Stadter, Jr., and Margaret Ross. The LaBranch will leave \$1000 to Celia LaBranch, known as Sister M. Gertrude; a filling station and 184 feet of real property at the crossing a mile east of Salem to the son, and the residue to the son for use as follows: To pay the widow, Farinda S. LaBranch, \$40 a month as long as she lives or remains unmarried. After she is dead the rest of the income Mrs. LaBranch is to divide equally among the children: Alfred E. LaBranch, Sadie M. Tallon, Agnes Nadon and Sister M. Gertrude. These payments are to be made as long as she remains a widow. On her death or remarriage the estate is to be distributed among the children.

Jesse Baird Will Speak, CE Event

International Officer Is Slated to Come Here for Convention

Dr. Jesse H. Baird, president of the San Francisco Theological seminary and vice-president of the International Society of Christian Endeavor, will be the main speaker at the annual convention of the Marion Christian Endeavor union when it convenes October 13-15, it was announced Thursday.

Dr. Baird is well known in Salem, having recently spoken at the Oregon Christian Endeavor union's convention, and having several times supplied the pulpit of the Presbyterian church. He will speak to the convention Saturday night, and on Sunday afternoon will give the closing address and lead the decision service. Much interest has already been

shown and committees have been appointed and are functioning toward the goal of a great convention. The challenging theme that came out of the international society's convention in Cleveland this July will be used—"Christ Calls." Young people and adults alike will be urged to attend and participate in the fellowship of the convention sessions. Public meetings will be held at 7:30 Friday, 7:45 Saturday night and at 2:30 Sunday afternoon. A banquet will be held Saturday night at 6:15 p. m. at the Court street Church of Christ.

Dr. Baird held the pastorate of several large churches in California before taking over his duties as president of San Francisco Theological seminary. He is well known throughout North America as a fine speaker, church leader, and challenger of youth. Dr. Baird spoke before 7000 at the great convention of the Christian Endeavorers of North America in Cleveland and "as well received."
