### Death Calls

#### Linen Founder

#### Benjamin Clarkson Miles Organized Plant That Bears His Name

Benjamin Clarkson Miles, 74, organizer of the Miles Linen company and for many years a prominent Oregon lumberman, died at a local hospital Monday morning following a 10 days' illness. Mr. Miles was an instructor in mathematics at the old Pacific academy in Newberg and had Herbert Hoover, former president of the United States, as one of his students before he went into the lumber industry. Mr. Hoover and Mr. Miles were fast friends and the former president visited the Miles home several times.

January 3, 1865, Benjamin Clarkson Miles was born in West Branch, Iowa, the son of Benjamin and Elizabeth Bean Miles. He came to Oregon in 1885 after completing his work at Penn college. He taught at Newberg's Pacific academy, now Pacific college, and later went into the bank at Newberg. He was also in the general merchandise business. In 1934 he became secretary of the business operating in both Newberg and Salem. The Spaulding and Miles homes join on Court street, near North Capitol.

**Joined Gravel Firm**  
He was married to Mrs. Anna Cook Bell of Newberg May 8, 1890, at the Salem residence of H. J. Minthorne, uncle of Herbert Hoover.

In 1918 he sold out his interest in the Spaulding company and became identified with the Oregon Sand and Gravel company.

In 1924, at the time Governor Walter G. Scott was trying to arouse interest in the linen industry, Mr. Miles went abroad to visit the linen centers of Europe. He returned in the late summer and that fall formed the Miles Linen company, of which he was president and manager. He sold his interests in the company in 1926 when he felt his health failing. In recent years he acquired an interest in the Yamhill Mills-Dennis Lumber company.

Mr. Miles served as representative from Yamhill county from 1903 to 1905. He came to Salem with his family in 1910 and had been an active member of the South Salem Friends church since it was established in 1912. He was a life-long member of the Society of Friends.

**Was YMCA Leader**  
He served as chairman of the board of managers of Pacific college and was a member of the Salem YMCA board for many years. He was always vitally interested in Christian education. Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Anna B. Miles of Salem; daughters, Mrs. Lyla Dann of Corvallis and Mrs. Eva Newlin of Gullford College, N. C.; son, Ross C. Miles of Salem, and six grandchildren.

**Funeral services** will be at the Clough-Barrick chapel Thursday, September 7 at 2:00 p. m. with Dr. Levi T. Pennington, president of Pacific college, Professor Charles C. Haworth of Salem and Rev. Dillon Mills, pastor of the South Salem Friends church, officiating. Interment in City View cemetery.

### Midway Approval Given by Chief

#### State Fair Games Clean, Don't Gamble, Says After Inspection

Police Chief Frank Minto reported all concessions at the Oregon state fair at meeting with his approval yesterday following a tour of inspection Sunday afternoon which he made on the invitation of fair officials. Chief Minto stated that in only one instance did he suggest that a change be made in the way in which a concession was operated in order to remove any implication of gambling, and that his request was immediately honored by the fair authorities.

Question as to the relation of the fair midway concessions to the state laws governing games of chance arose last week when Chief Minto announced that no quarter would be shown to games on the fair midway which were questionable under existing laws. Fair authorities denied any intention of allowing offside concessions, and requested that the chief inspect the midway attractions in person.

#### Salem Woman Dies After Long Illness; Active in Church Fields

Mrs. Charles A. Clarke, widow of C. A. Clarke, died at her home this morning after a several weeks' illness. Mrs. Clarke was an active member of the First Methodist church.

Martha Wheeler was born March 2, 1859, at Long Point, Ill., the daughter of Edwin and Martha Donoh Wheeler. When a small child she moved to Onarga with her family where she was educated. She was married to Charles A. Clarke on November 27, 1878. They moved to Nebraska in 1884 and came to Salem in 1891. They made their home in Polk county until 1914, when they moved to Salem. The couple celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1928.

Mrs. Clarke was the mother of five children, Mrs. W. H. McCall of Bozeman, Mont., Leon, who died in 1918; Mrs. Maurice Bullock of Lowell, Mass.; Roscoe W. Clarke of Salem and Mrs. Howard George of Bend. Nine grandsons, one granddaughter and one great granddaughter also survive.

Services will be held from the W. T. Rigdon chapel Tuesday, September 5, at 3:30 p. m. with Dr. J. O. Harrison officiating.

### Local Cases up In Higher Court

Two local court cases will be argued before the state supreme court at hearings here today and Wednesday.

The first, set for today, is the case of Metropolitan Life Insurance company vs. Sarah Kimball, involving a mortgage foreclosure. The second is the suit of Anna Savage against Albert T. Savage, Jr., executor of the A. T. Savage estate, in which the plaintiff seeks title to part of a farm and farm property by trust by virtue of her claim the property was purchased with her money.

The high court today also will hear arguments as to whether or not a man may be prosecuted in the state courts for larceny of federal property. George Raymond Frack, defendant, was sentenced in Clackamas county circuit court to 10 years in the penitentiary for larceny of CCC camp property.
