

Records Machine Eyed by Court

Committee Reports Choice of Equipment; Advise Remodeling Space

Installation of a machine to keep a daily record of balances for each tax year and to give a balance on the roll after each payment, and a contingent question of more space in the tax collection office which would be necessary for such a machine were major items before the county court yesterday morning.

C. C. Ward, county auditing official, Ted Brabec of the tax collection department, and Floyd Bowers, assistant to the state auditor testified as a committee investigating the machine that they had chosen the equipment desired, and had selected proposals to provide for the necessary space for the machine.

They made two suggestions. One was to install a mezzanine floor in the tax collection department for holding records which now take up much room elsewhere, and the other was to convert the space now occupied by the sheriff's storage room and the men's lavatory room on the first floor into storage space for records.

This would require reinstallation of a lavatory on the ground floor, and would also necessitate the tearing out of the partition between the present lavatory and the sheriff's storage room. A safe would be installed for the treasurer instead of the present vault, which could not be moved.

Reference of the matter to the county budget committee will precede any action on the matter it was understood.

Northwest Apple Shippers Gloomy

SPOKANE, Sept. 12.—(AP)—A gloomy picture for the northwest apple export business this winter was painted tonight at a meeting of shippers and transportation men preceding the Pacific northwest advisory board meeting tomorrow.

J. A. Early, president of the Seattle port commission, said after the meeting, the consensus of shippers and growers from all of the northwest's apple producing centers was that much of the export crop would be disposed of, if ships could be found to handle it.

"However, 18 foreign flag lines, which normally operate refrigerator ships to the northwest, and handle the bulk of the exports, seem to be entirely out of the picture as far as apples are concerned," Early said.

School Head Hits Taxes on Realty

ONTARIO, Sept. 12.—(AP)—State Superintendent of Schools Rex Putnam told delegates to the annual convention of the Oregon Association of Real Estate Boards that all but 2.1 per cent of \$21,000,000 raised annually for school purposes comes from real estate.

"We must devise some means of alleviating these inequalities," Putnam said.

Claude H. Murphy, Oregon real estate commissioner, advocated establishment of a system of relations between Oregon and other states in the application of real estate laws.

Joseph A. Nance, of the Federal Home Owners association, said there have been no foreclosures of 90 per cent loans in Oregon under the FHA insured plan.

Yesterday's losses included the new British oil tanker Inverliffy, built for a London company by the Nazis at Hamburg last year, and the picturesque old Finnish bark Olivebank which struck a mine about 105 miles southwest of Esbjerg, Denmark.

The Olivebank, a 2795-ton vessel in the England-Finnish trade, exploded with a great roar, killing 14 men. Seven were saved.

The Inverliffy was attacked by a submarine near Havre. Her crew of approximately 40 was rescued by a Standard Oil tanker.

Heat Cure for Syphilis Described By Researchist of GE's Staff as Local Kiwanis Holds Weekly Meet

Damon Jackson, researchist on the staff of the General Electric company, yesterday described to members of the Kiwanis club the methods of heat therapy as applied for the cure of syphilis at the regular noon meeting at the Marion hotel.

Speaking for the instruction of laymen, and making liberal use of case histories, Jackson described common misunderstandings of the disease, and especially emphasized the fact that the disease is not confined to any particular social classes, but is to be found prevalent among all types and kinds of individuals.

He paid special attention to the fever treatments developed through the efforts of his company for the use of persons suffering from syphilis. Such treatments, he declared, serve to hasten the effect of regular drug therapy, which has been the traditional means of curing the disease.

Yale Man Thought up First Sub Attack But Hand-Cranked, One-Man Barrel Fails in Raid On British Warship at New York, 1775

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—(AP)—A submarine's first attempt to sink a warship, which took place in New York harbor in 1775, was pretty comical.

The submarine, devised by a Yale student named David Bushnell, was a wooden affair not much bigger than a barrel and held only one man, who propelled it by cranking furiously on a couple of levers. The craft was named the "Turtle" because it looked like a turtle.

The British were trying to blockade New York, and one Ezra Lee was commissioned to polish off, by means of the Turtle, the warship Eagle, at anchor near Sandy Hook. Bushnell didn't go because, he said, he wasn't feeling well.

Copper Sheathing Fails

In the dark of the night, Lee buttoned himself into the Turtle, submerged and cranked out to the warship. The plan of attack was to screw a time bomb to the hull of the Eagle and scurry away before it went off.

But when Lee tried to do this, he made the belated discovery that the warship was covered with well-nigh impenetrable copper sheathing. So, after lurking around, baffled in the water for more than 12 hours, Lee withdrew.

Disappointed, he determined to set the bomb off anyway, so he released it in the water a short distance from the Eagle. Presently the bomb exploded.

Fahrenheit for a period of some five or six hours. A treatment every week over several months is necessary for full results, he maintained.

Jackson displayed a number of exhibits of handiwork which were the products of syphilitic patients either suffering from the disease or recovering from it. He described the case of a man once high in public life who had failed to take treatments when he contracted the disease, and who thereafter became insane as a direct result. He told of other cases of remarkable cures by electric treatments.
