



ONG Rifles Are 4th in Matches

Team Rates High Among 47 Other Squads at National Shoot

The Oregon national guard finished fourth in a field of 47 national guard rifle teams at the national rifle matches at Camp Perry, Ohio, while it placed 12th in the entire field of 127 regular army, national guard, reserve officers and civilian teams, the national guard headquarters announced here yesterday.

Among national guard teams, only Ohio, Connecticut and Cali-fornia placed higher than Oregon, whose team scored 2,652 out of a possible 3,000. The Oregon team now is on its way home. Members of the Oregon team

and their scores follow, 300 being a perfect score:
