September 25 Is Named as Starting Date at Independence

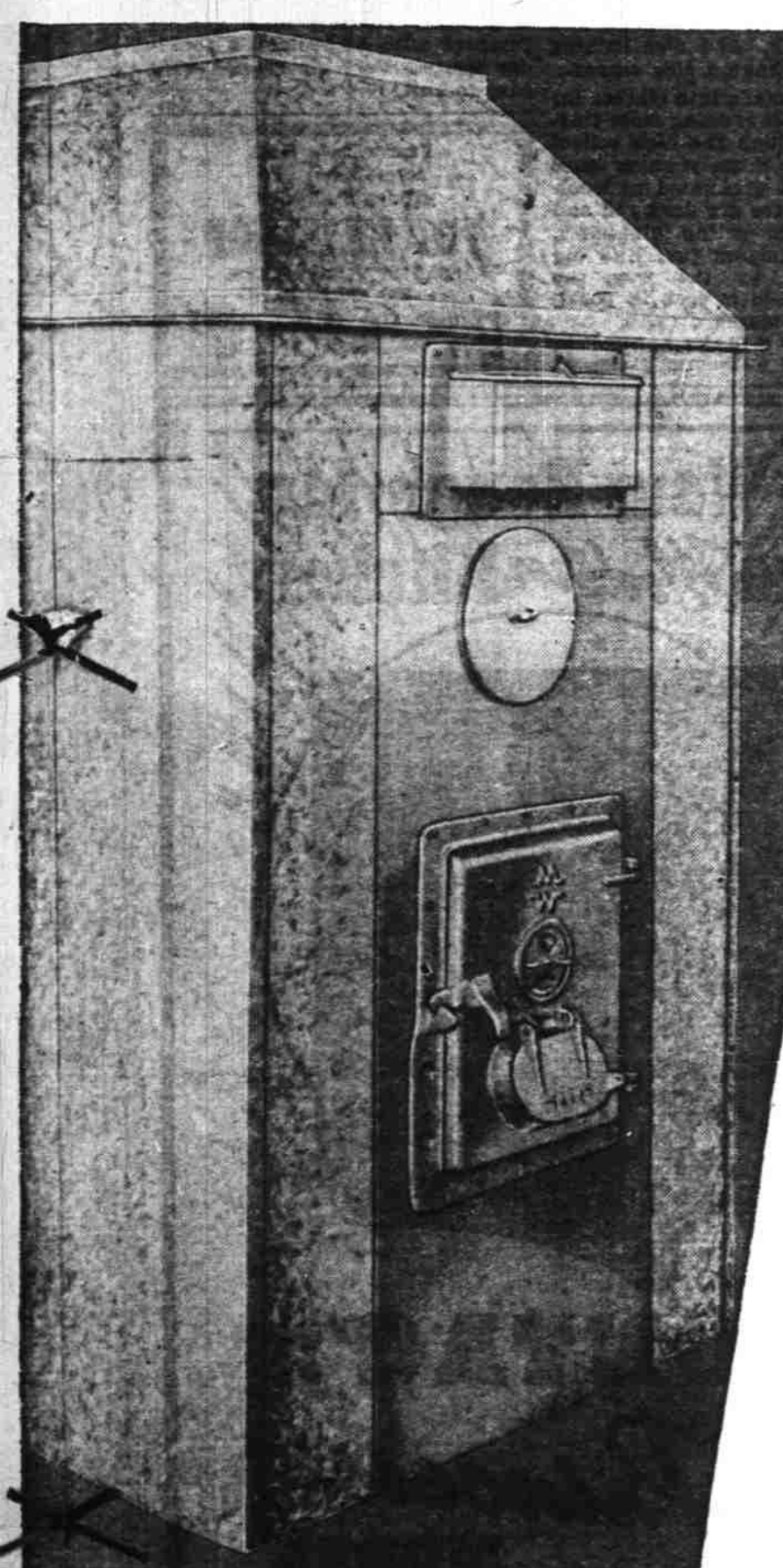
106 Pupils Start At Auburn School

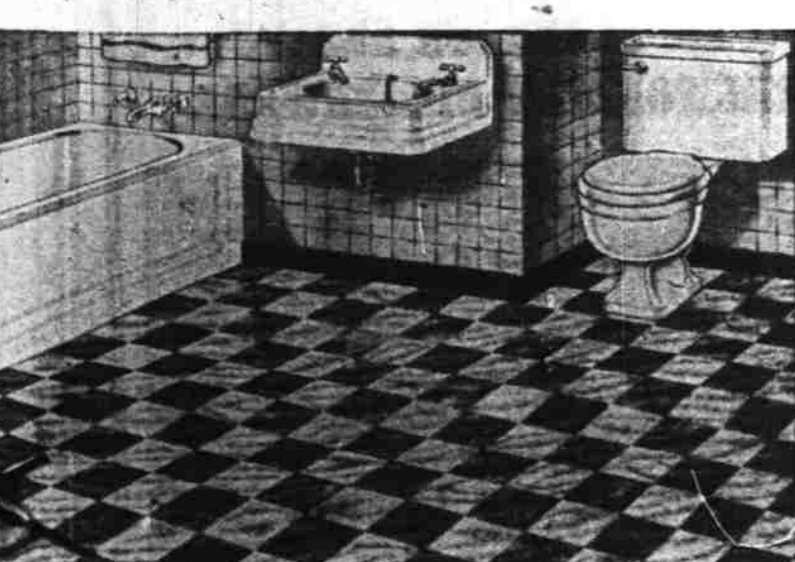

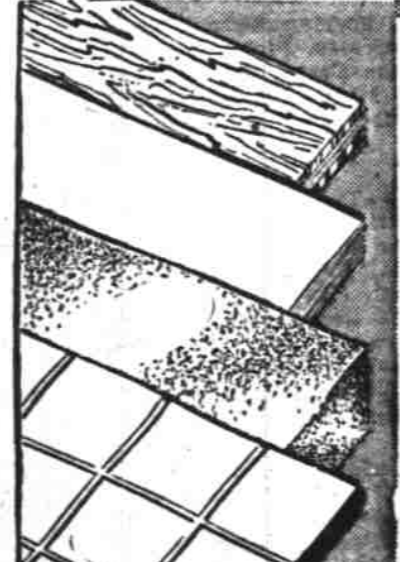

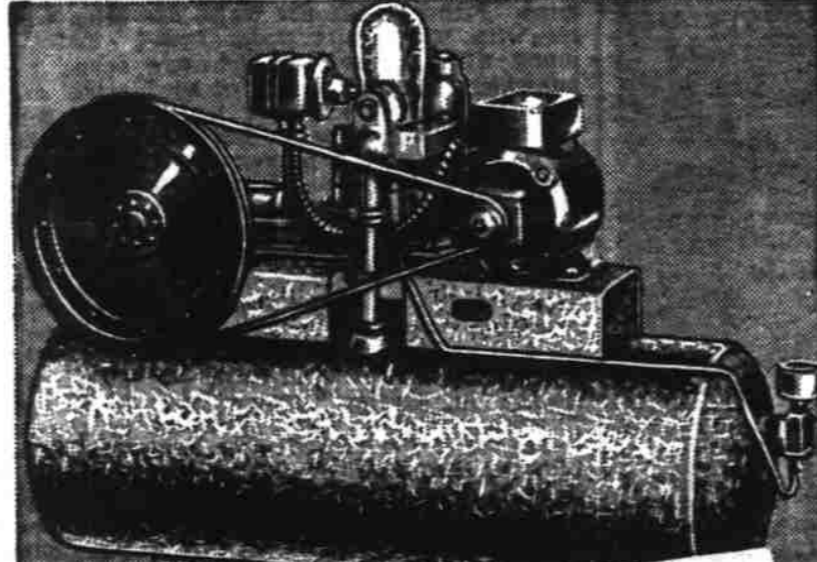
