Drager's Trial November 13th

Richardson's Trial Date Also Set October 30 on Shortage Case

Orders continuing the grand jury and criminal cases now pending through the October term, and definitely setting the trial dates of David G. Drager, county treasurer, and W. Y. Richardson, his former deputy, for November 13 and October 30 respectively were filed yesterday by Judge L. H. McManis.

A replacement will be drawn for the grand jury prior to its first meeting during the week of October 9 to take the place of Ralph Swartz, who died recently. The jury is expected to continue a special investigation into the actions of certain county officers under the direction of Special Prosecutor Mark Weatherford of Albany during the October term.

The Drager and Richardson trials will continue prosecution of early and criminal cases now pending on charges of larceny of public funds. Richardson was tried on the charge last June, but no verdict was given owing to a disagreement among jury members.

In department two, Judge L. G. Lowell has granted a request to be sent to the supreme court asking that a special judge be assigned to hear the case of William F. Woodward vs. Walter Pearson, state treasurer, for which an early trial has been asked. Woodward seeks to restrain publication of the case.

Community Chest Aid Is Held Duty

Judge Rossmann Points to "Good Business" Angle Eclipsing Charity

"Appeal of the community chest isn't an appeal to charity, but should come as a sense of duty," said Judge George Rossmann, associate justice of the state supreme court, addressing the Salem Realty board yesterday noon at the Golden Pheasant.

Judge Rossmann said he had first-hand opportunity to study humanity in the rough as a municipal judge in Portland 23 years ago, and that he knew that many of the people who will benefit by the chest funds lack only a spirit of acquiescence.

Chest "Good Business"

He pointed out that from 60 to 70 per cent of chest funds will go to children, through the various youth organizations such as the Boy Scouts, YMCA, YWCA, Catholic youth organizations, etc. The other 30 to 40 per cent, he said, will go largely to Hotel de Minto, the Salvation Army and other such organizations intended for the assistance of needy adults.

Stating that "every community can have just as many paupers as it wants," Judge Rossmann said it comes under the heading of "good business" to support the community chest in Salem and thus keep pauperism at a minimum.
