### Letters Pour in With Tax Checks


Second Half State Income Assessments Are Due Monday, October 2

More than 2000 letters, conaining checks covering the second half payments of state income tax for the year 1939, were received at the offices of the state tax commission here Friday.

The deadline for second half payments has been fixed for Monday, October 2. Penalty and interest will accrue against income taxes not paid until after that daté. First half payments were due April 1.

Tax officials estimated the second half payments at approxi-mately \$1,200,000, with a total of \$4,800,000 for the year.

The 1939 payments are based on incomes for the year 1938.
