

School Offers Study Fields

"Night University" in City Goes Into Action Next Monday at Oldhi

Monday, October 2, will be the first night of classes of the "night university" of the state system of higher education, which will offer five courses covering such fields as education, sociology, education, and geography, in the old Salem high school. It has been announced by W. G. Beattie, of the general extension division of the system.

Courses will carry two hours of college or university credit and will meet each week 7:15 to 9:15. Included in classes to be offered are Oregon geography, Monday; family relationships, Tuesday; education for citizenship, and history of painting, Wednesday; and population theory, Thursday.

30 Provides 5 Teachers
From the University of Oregon will come the following for the Salem unit: Alfred L. Lomax, professor of business administration; Warren D. Smith, head of the department of geography and geology; Elton H. Moore, professor of sociology, James C. Stovall, instructor in geography; and N. B. Zane, associate professor of statistics. Mrs. Emma Peterson, instructor in family relationships, and Mr. Beattie, associate professor of education, will be sent by the general extension division.

Dr. Smith, Mr. Stovall, and Mr. Lomax will teach the geography of Oregon course, which is designed to give students a survey of fundamental facts on the physical background of the state. It will also cover the important social and economic problems facing the commonwealth. All three instructors are considered authorities in their fields.

Family Problems Studied
The aim of the family relationship course will be to develop a better understanding of present day family life and some of its existing problems. Renaissance and modern American painters, with emphasis upon characteristics of the period to which they belong as well as to the painters themselves, will be discussed in the history of painting course.

The education for citizenship course will study the objectives of public school education with special reference to citizenship. Procedures in school and out will be studied in the light of their effectiveness in guiding youth to develop an understanding and functioning citizenship.

The "population and population theory" course will give special reference to increase and decrease and problems of quality. Also to be examined will be current problems of control, such as neo-Malthusianism, eugenics, and other topics.

Further information about courses may be obtained by writing the general extension division, University of Oregon, Eugene. Students may register at the opening classes of the subjects in which they are interested. Those not seeking university or college credit may be excused from written work if they so desire. Courses are open to all who wish to take them.

Beer Sellers Hit At Independence

PORTLAND, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The wine department of the state liquor control commission, created July 15, has seized or detained from sale 33,772 gallons of wine, the commission learned today.

Ralph W. Staley, head of the wine section, said a laboratory approved at the last commission meeting was being enlarged and 72 analyses had been made. The commission notified wine wholesalers "the retail price structure shall be maintained as designated under the retail fair trade prices regardless of the change of the wholesale market" in attempting to curb an "apparent price war."

28 Given Tests From Seal Fund

Twenty eight persons were given fluoroscopic tests at the Salem Deaconess hospital the past week from funds raised from the sale of Christmas seals. This is in connection with the tuberculosis control program of the health department. These persons, who had previously given positive reactions to tuberculin tests, had returned for a recheck. The health department, located in the Masonic building, will give tuberculosis tests without charge. A number of clinics have been arranged for next week by the health department. Monday afternoon milk handlers will be given physical examinations while an all-day clinic for children of school and pre-school age will be held at Silverton. Salem high school boys will be given physical examinations all day Tuesday and Thursday. A clinic will be held at the health department Wednesday afternoon for school children and pre-school boys and girls. Saturday from 10 a. m. to 12, immunizations, vaccinations and tuberculin tests will be given at the health department.

The grain handlers will meet to discuss a new contract with exporters.

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Valley Project's Job List Small

Hundreds Turned Away as no Work Available Immediately

No large number of jobs will be made available immediately by the major units of the Willamette valley project for which funds have been appropriated by congress. R. H. Kipp, executive secretary of the Willamette basin commission, said yesterday. Hundreds of men have been inquiring at Kipp's office in the capitol concerning employment prospects.

When construction of the three Lane county dams, first to be built, gets under way, 1500 or more jobs will be available but local men will be given first call, Kipp said. Plans for one of the three dams already have been sent to Washington, D. C., for approval by the chief army engineers.

Bar Revivment Under Way
Only employment being provided by the project in Marion county at present is on the \$37,470 Gray Eagle bar revivment contract five miles up the Willamette from Salem. Work with bulldozers is now in progress under direction of Kuckenberg and company, contractors.

"Many details" remain to be worked out before relocation of the North Santiam highway between Niagara and Detroit, to be done under supervision of the army engineers, may be started. Kipp reported, however, possibility that this unit of the basin project may be begun before the close of the coming winter. The present road will be inundated when the Niagara dam, for which no appropriation has yet been made, is built.

Smith Will Take Corporation Post

Lloyd R. Smith, Portland, will arrive in Salem Monday to assume his new duties as state corporation commissioner. Smith succeeds James H. Hazlett, democrat, who was appointed corporation commissioner early in the ex-Governor Charles H. Martin administration. The new appointee said there would be no immediate changes in his operating personnel. He is treasurer of the republican state central committee.

Prompt Filing Asked by UCC

Many Jobless Claimants Allow Time to Pass, Delaying Benefits

Not all of the time that elapses between loss of job and receipt of unemployment compensation can be attributed to safeguards set up by the state law, Administrator Silas Gaiser pointed out here yesterday.

Many claimants lose a week's time by allowing a week to elapse between the time they become unemployed and the actual filing of claim for benefits, a survey by the central office disclosed. This is not required by law and simply delays by a week the time when benefit checks may be issued.

Workers are advised to report to their nearest state employment office to register for work and file claim for unemployment compensation on their very first day of unemployment. No credit can be given, either as a waiting week or compensable time, the administrator explained, for any week in which the claimant does not sign either an original or continued claim for benefits.

Continued Claim Advised
Where any doubt exists concerning status of a claim, the claimant should continue his claim each week in order to preserve any benefit rights that may be established later, for the com-

mission requires that a claimant must continue his claim within 10 days from the expiration of the week for which he claims benefits.

Reporting by an employer of additional earnings during the prescribed base year, registration of a hitherto not subject employer, or a decision that the claim-

ant's unemployment was due to a layoff for economic reasons rather than to a labor dispute are some of the factors which may result in redetermination allowing additional benefits, but unless the claimant has established compensable weeks to cover this amount, payments cannot be made.

Foreclosure Land For Parks Scheme

Expansion of the city park system through use of land acquired by the city on street lien foreclosures was proposed yesterday by Councilman David O'Hara.

O'Hara said he had several areas which the city has taken over under consideration as possible park sites. He did not disclose the locations, but said one was in North Salem, one in South Salem and another in one other area.

Discussions with citizens as to feasibility of the plan and possible locations of new parks will be made, O'Hara said, before the proposal is put before the city council.

Stayton Girl, 9, Injured by Car

Struck when she darted in front of a car driven by Gerald A. Cone, Donald, near 12th and Hoyt streets, Vera Johnson, nine-year old Stayton girl, received a broken nose, cuts on bruises and lost several teeth, police reported.

The girl was struck, police said, when she ran into the car's path as it was passing a boy on a bicycle. She was given first aid treatment by the Salem first aid crew and taken to the Deaconess hospital.

Mrs. Ira Herbert, 1831 Fair-ground road, was given treatment for a fractured ankle, received when she fell from a stool.

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
