

### Trim Skyliners Boost Nash Sales





Only a limited number of feeding trials have been conducted at the Union station in fattening lambs on pasture, but present indications are that the lambs will make much more rapid and economical gains when they are fed grain in addition to good pasture than when they are fed grain and alfalfa hay in the usual feed lot manner, says D. E. Richards, superintendent. These tests indicate that feeding of grain on good irrigated pasture will be a practical way to fatten early feeder ambs that do not get fat nursing

Unless lambs are given some aind of grain in addition to pasture, they are inclined to grow rather than to fatten, making fraud provisions of the securities gains of only about six pounds a act of 1933 and the mail fraud month. The same lambs fed grain statute in connection with the in addition to pasture will gain twice as fast, or at the rate of about one-half pound a day, or 15 pounds a month.
