

## Aircrafts Go On Buy Spree

Gains up to 3 Points Are Reduced Before Close; Other Stocks Down

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Aircrafts put on a war-buy flight of their own today and left many other issues struggling behind small minus signs. Gains for the aviation ranged

from 1 to 3 points at the best, but these were finally reduced. Steels, motors, rails, oils, copers, rubbers and utilities generally found the going difficult. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks ended the day with a net decline of .1 of a point, as last-minute offerings cut quotations in virtually all departments.

**Start Is Slow**  
The list got off to a slow start but with moderate improvement, there was a subsequent slip-up, then a comeback with dealings a bit livelier. Sluggish intervals were frequent and transfers for the five hours amounted to 1,161,240 shares compared with 1,403,470 the day before.

Markets, on the whole, drew scant stimulation from news of the European conflict. Business developments at home were still cheering. Despite hesitancy elsewhere, new highs for the year were recorded for Douglas Aircraft, Glenn Martin, North American Aviation and Consolidated Aircraft. Modest gains were held by Bethlehem Steel, General Motors, U. S. Gypsum, Philip Morris, Delaware & Hudson, General Foods, Public Service of N. J. and Caterpillar Tractor.

## Selling Checked On Grain Futures

Bad 1940 Wheat Outlook Is Factor; Buying Is Light

CHICAGO, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Increasing seriousness of the 1940 wheat crop outlook in the southwest checked selling of grain futures today but encouraged only little buying to offset profit taking that kept wheat quotations fractionally lower most of the session.

Pessimistic reports of drought conditions which have delayed seeding throughout much of the hard winter wheat belt and in many sections of the soft wheat area were not regarded as a basis for active buying although traders admitted the foundation is being laid for crop scares next fall.

Wheat fluctuated within a cent range and at times was as much as 1/2 cent higher than yesterday's close. Final prices, however, were 1/4-1/2 lower than yesterday, December 85 1/2-3/4, May 84 1/2-3/4.

**Securities Disturb**  
The unsettled tone of the securities market disturbed the market. Some purchasing wheat was credited to mills, with ship-

pers' sales totaling 52,000 bushels. Cloudy skies were reported over parts of Kansas but higher temperatures over much of the southwest aggravated the drought. H. C. Donovan, one expert, said there may not be enough vegetation to protect soil against dust blowing. Abnormally heavy supplies, even for war-time, in Canada and Argentina, with crop prospects very good in the southern hemisphere, where harvest will be under way in two months, overshadowed the domestic outlook.

The dairy judging team won second place in the dairy cattle judging contest in competition with teams from 3 states. Carl Schultz, Woodburn, placed first in judging Jerseys and Guernseys and Everett Struckmeier, Cloverdale, was fifth in the entire contest. Herman Gochel, Silverton, was the third member of the winning team in the national chapter contest. An Illinois team test-

won the contest while Washington was third. Edgar Spiekerman, The Dalles, and Robert Lundy, Myrtle Point, were selected to the coveted honor of The American Farmer Degree and were presented with gold keys along with 86 representatives from other states. Leadership and farming ability were the basis for the selection.

In competition with 7,000 FFA chapters in the United States, Corvallis won honorable mention in the national chapter contest. Edgar Spiekerman, former state president of Oregon FFA and Oregon's official delegate to the convention, is chairman of the national program of work committee for the coming year.
