The win left the Reds in undisputed possession of first place in the league race.

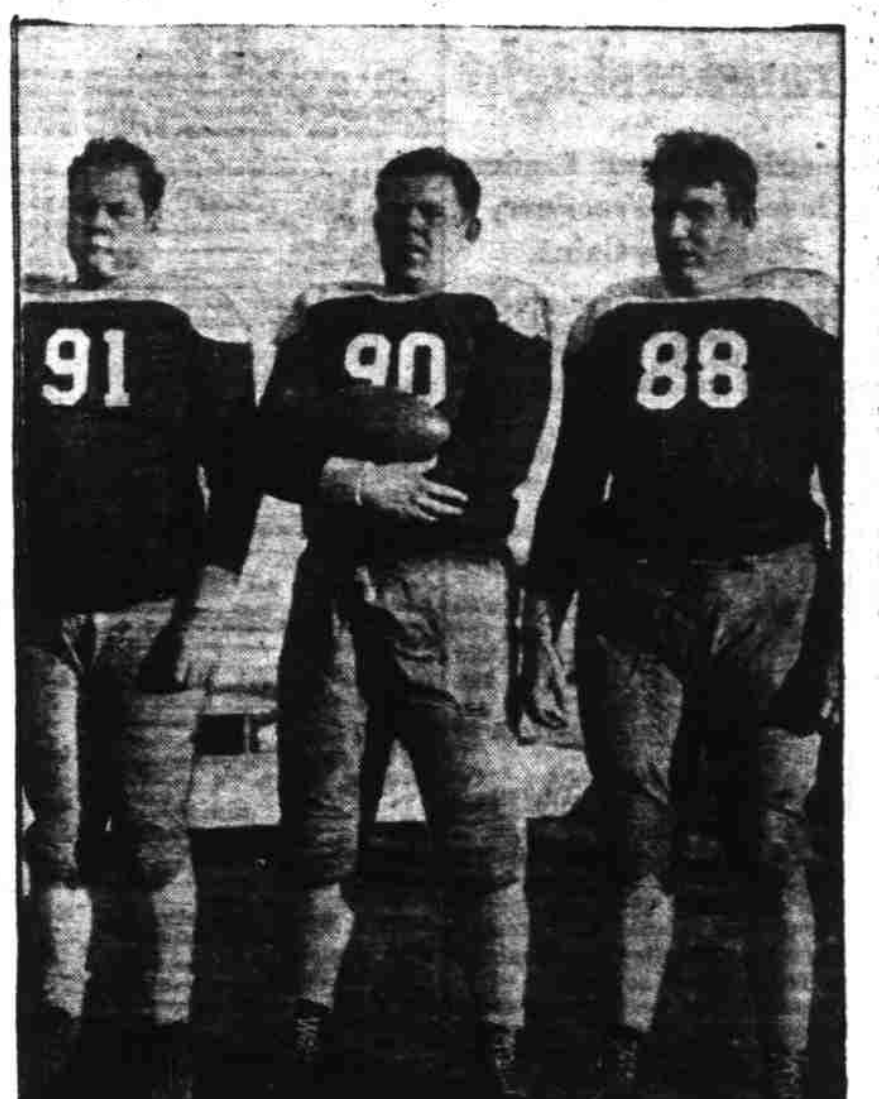
Water Level Low In Rickreal Wells
