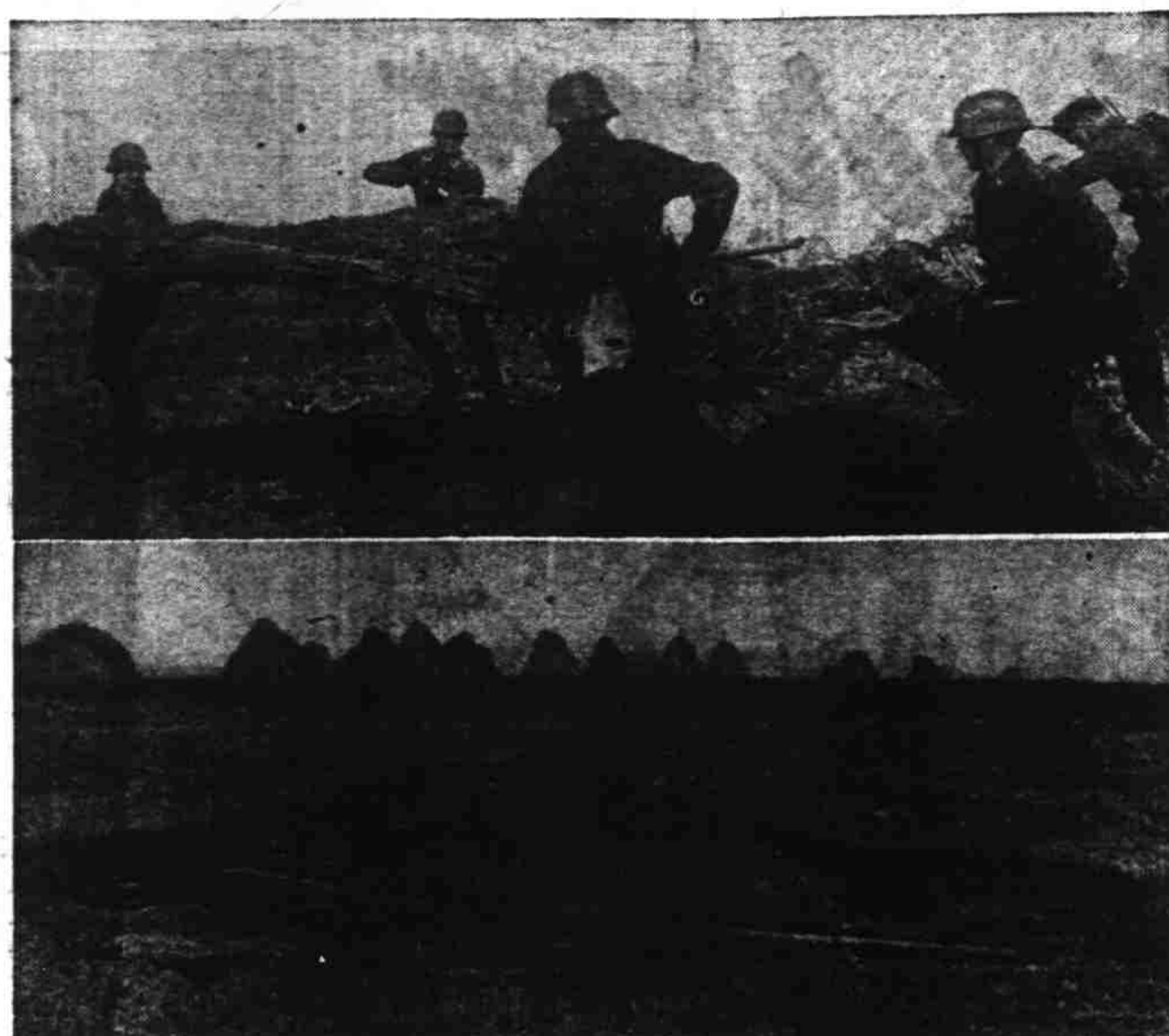

communications was invoked just before the war against Poland started and again immediately after England and France declared themselves in a state of war with Germany.
Persons in informed circles merely shrugged their shoulders when this interpretation was mentioned. The belief was expressed that an offensive under preparation would be directed almost exclusively against Great Britain.

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Concentrations of German troops sighted along the southern half of The Netherlands-German frontier caused nervousness late today in villages along the border.
The German troops were plainly visible from the hills which line the frontier from Gentep to Vaals.

This was said to be the first time there had been any noticeable troop movements opposite The Netherlands province of Limburg although a week ago observers noted new fortifications were under construction in the Siegfried line opposite Vaals of the southern tip of The Netherlands.

'Peaceful' Fields Packed With Nazi-Laid Land Mines



Planting the seeds of death is graphically shown in photos above released by German censors of Nazi troops laying land mines near the Siegfried Line on the western front. Top photo shows soldiers camouflaging mines with grass mats over which advancing French will tread, causing instant explosion. Second photo pictures an innocent looking hay pile in a field between France's Maginot Line and Germany's west wall. Under the hay pile is a death trap. French have used pigs to run ahead of troops to "feel out" such mines, clearing the way for advance. There is no record of what happened to the pigs.

Wrecked U-Boat On Dover Shoals

LONDON, Oct. 26.—(AP)—The British admiralty announced tonight that "the shattered wreck of a German U-boat was found today on the Goodwin sands."

(The Goodwin sands are considered exceedingly dangerous shoals in the Strait of Dover. They are just off the southeast coast of Kent, England, and flank the southern approach to the Thames river.)

President Makes Address From White House For Forum

The administrator, who formerly was US high commissioner to the Philippines, called his address "Frontiers of the Pacific," and devoted much of it to a discussion of the Philippines, which he termed "not only one of the main elements of our protection in the Pacific, but * * * also our own open door to Malaysia and Asia, wherein half the total population of the world is found."

He pointed out that unless there was a change in existing law—a change possible only at the initiative of the Philippines themselves—the island would be politically separated from the United States in 1946, and added:

"I often wonder if our people realize what we are giving up."

The president's speech, made at the senate neared the final action on his proposal to repeal the arms embargo, was delivered from the White House under the auspices of the New York Herald Tribune forum on "The War's Challenge to the United States."

The president also praised the "majority of the press and the radio" for "objective reporting" of the international situation. He said this had worked so well that

he wished "for more of it in the field of domestic news." After repeating that this country is neutral and does not

intend to get involved in the war, the president said:
"That we can be neutral in thought as well as in action, as I have said before, is impossible of fulfillment because again, the people of this country, thinking things through calmly and without prejudice, have been and are making up their minds about the merits of current events on other continents."
"It is a fact increasingly manifest that presentation of real news has sharpened the minds and the judgment of men and women everywhere in these days of real public discussion—and we Americans begin to know the difference between the truth on the one side and the falsehood on the other, no matter how often the falsehood is iterated and reiterated. Repetition does not transform a lie into a truth."
