Highway Boosters Meet at Albany

ALBANY—South Santiam highway boosters met at Albany Wednesday night to hear Dr. E. B. McDaniel, president of the Oregon State Motor association. Men from Sisters, Redmond, Sweet Home, Foster, Prineville, Tangent, Newport, Eugene and Salem were present.

An expenditure of \$770,000 is estimated necessary to complete the Linn county road between Albany and Sisters, the speaker said. Thus far total expenditures on the Linn county road total \$1,458,190.37, including \$764,851.06 of state funds and \$232,885.28 of Linn county funds. The

federal government furnished the remaining \$460,454.

Dr. McDaniel said that in contrast \$1,422,576.16 has been spent on the North Santiam highway, of which \$131,000 was contributed by Marion county and the remaining by the federal government.

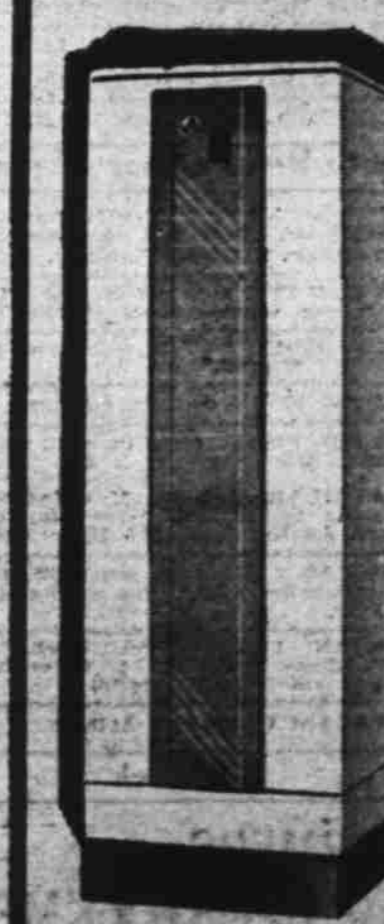
