Only Three Schools Send Representatives to Meet

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 15.—(AP)—Representatives of three northwest colleges, Willamette, Montana State and Portland university, met here today in an informal gathering to discuss possibilities of eventual formation of a Columbia basin athletic conference—an idea which has been on the fire for a year or more.

Three other institutions which were invited to the meeting, University of Idaho, Montana and Gonzaga, failed to send representatives. Both Montana and Gonzaga, however, expressed interest and willingness to follow future developments. Those present were Father John Maragraf, faculty representative for Portland university and Eddie Fitzpatrick, Portland basketball coach; S. R. Dyche, director of athletics and football coach at Montana State; Spec Keens, director of athletics and football coach at Willamette, and Robert C. Notson, member of the athletic board of Willamette.

The meeting was purely informative, those present explained, and there was no discussion of immediate formation of a new conference. May Develop Relations. However, it was added, "improved athletic relations between the participating schools and those which were invited but which did not attend were almost certain to develop from the contacts."

J. E. Burly Miller, faculty representative of the Montana State university athletic board, sent a telegram expressing the university's willingness to sit in on future meetings and to discuss "any schedule rearrangements" which might result or seem desirable after today's meeting. A point of interest brought out by representatives at the meeting was that a recent compilation of statistical strength of football teams disclosed five of the six potential members were within 1.5 points of each other. No definite arrangements were made for a second meeting, but it was thought one might be called sometime after the annual Pacific coast conference meeting, when the status of Montana and the University of Idaho, the "orphans" members of the conference is expected to be more clearly defined.

Mason, Waller to Play in Backfield

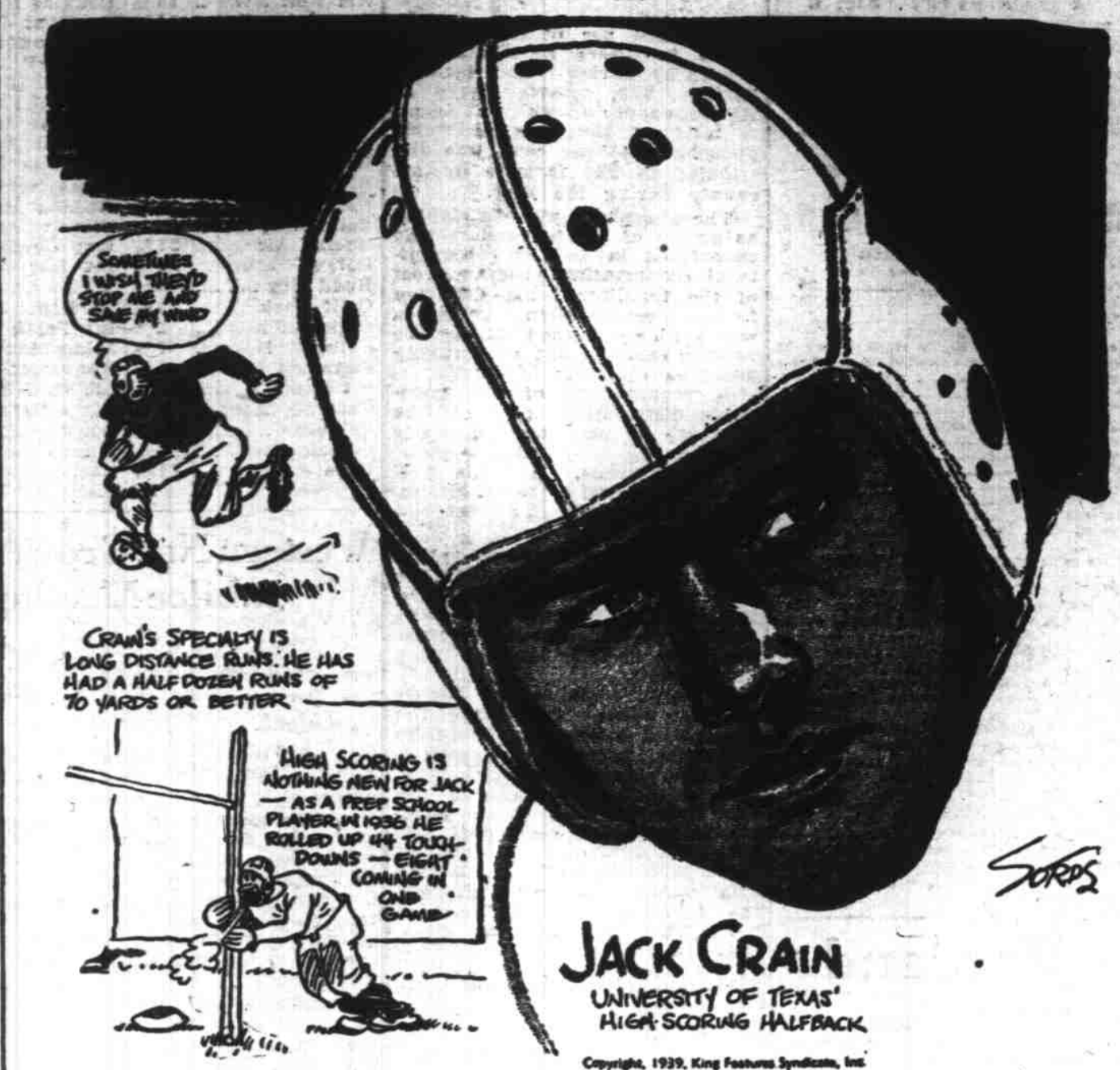
