Texas Aggies Top Club

Vols Replaced In First Spot

Tennessee Drops to Second In Sixth Associated Press Survey

NEW YORK, Nov. 20—(AP)—Driving past a Tennessee team which had a hard time protecting its winning streak against long-shot Vanderbilt, Texas A & M today shot into first place in the race for selection as No. 1 football power in the nation.

After four straight weeks in the driver's seat, the Vols were dropped into second place in the season's sixth Associated Press ranking poll. At the same time the Aggies, a team which Coach Homer Norton converted from a Southwest conference also-ran into a club only one game away from a perfect season, drew 33 first-place votes, 37 seconds and 17 thirds on 110 ballots for a total of 963 points.

Texas Oust Vols
That was enough to beat out Tennessee by 65 points, and even the Vols were hard-pressed to hold second. Roaring up behind them with a 35-6 scarping of Dartmouth's Indians came unbeaten and untied Cornell, whose performance was impressive enough to earn 865 points, only 33 less than Tennessee and 101 more than Southern California, which had been third a week ago.

Thus the standings find the three top-flight all-winning teams at the head of the list, followed by Southern California, Tulane, each tied once, and then in order by five teams, each of which has been defeated once.

The vacancies were taken over by Duke, Iowa and Missouri, as Tulane moved up a notch from sixth to fifth and Ohio State and Notre Dame each advanced two places.

USC Gridmen Head for East

Notre Dame Next on Slate For USC Team; 39 Make Trip

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 20—(AP)—The mighty Trojans of Southern California headed east tonight, bound for South Bend and the fourteenth grid battle with the Irish of Notre Dame.

Thirty-nine stalwarts of Troy were selected for the trip, and at least two were hopeful that history would repeat itself in this bitterly-waged intersectional warfare.

They were Grenville Lansdell, No. 1 man of Troy's imposing array of quarterbacks, and Harry Smith, 220-pound running guard, Southern California's leading candidates for all-America honors.

Two years ago when USC invaded the Notre Dame backyard big Harry Smith suddenly barged out of the substitute ranks and turned in a game that started him on the road to national recognition as the most feared of Troy's linemen.

And it was the same game that Lansdell, the lad they call "Fog Over Pasadena," executed the feat a Trojan quarterback hadn't done since the days of Morley Drury a decade before. He played a full 60 minutes against the hard hitting Irish, and played it well, even in defeat.

The spotlight will be on these two Saturday, but it may shift to others. Backing up Lansdell, for instance, will be Doyle Nave, the pass-throwing hero of Troy's victory over Duke in the Rose Bowl, and behind him comes A. M. by Schindler, 190 pounds of activity.

MacMitchell Wins Cross-Country Run

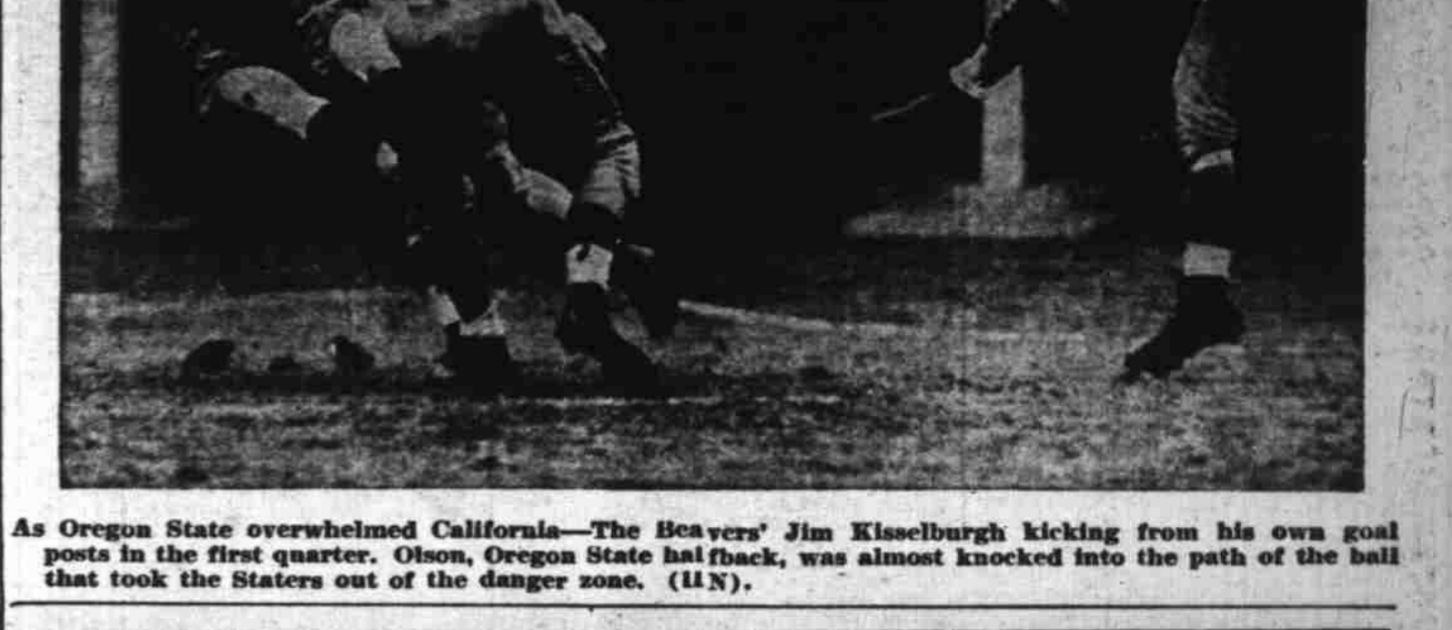
