The Stacey fox farm here is the largest in the western states. It was for the past several years the largest fur ranch in Oregon, formerly exceeded only by one in Hood River. The Hood River ranch has since been divided and the Stacey ranch has steadily grown. This year 550 silver fox pelts were taken on this farm.



Nazi Pocket Ships Teach Lesson



Success of fast, heavily armored nazi pocket battleships have virtually reduced some 62 cruisers owned by maritime powers to junk, according to Captain John H. Craige, US marine corps, retired, noted naval strategist. In building pocket ships, Germany has shown it is possible to construct warcraft no bigger than heavy cruiser size which can outclass US, British and Japanese heavy cruisers in battle, can escape dreadnaughts. Pictured top is Germany's raider, Admiral Scheer, new type craft, which, Craige believes, could outrun the USS Pennsylvania, below, and outflight UB heavy cruisers. The answer, he said, is more light cruisers carrying battleship type guns.

## Fruit Shippers Want Rates Cut

Apple, Pear Growers Seek To Offset War Through Lower Rail Costs

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 28.-(P) Pacific northwest shippers of apples and winter pears, cut off from European markets by war. have started a new transcontinental railroad rate reduction campaign, Reuben Benz said today.

Benz, a Yakima, Wash., apple shipper and chairman of the apple rate committee of the northwest perishable traffic bureau, said that "previously, 50 per cent of the winter pears and from 26 to 25 per cent of the Oregon and Washington apples went through the Panama canal."

Railroads already have denied one petition of the traffic bureau, made up of shipping organisations at Medford, Hood River, Wenatchee and Yakima, for lower rates.
