### Paulson Returned Here for Hearing

#### Former Training School Instructor Faces Morals Count

Mark A. Paulson will probably be arraigned in justice court today to enter plea on a morals charge for which he was recently indicted by the Marion county grand jury after having been returned here early yesterday from California by Sheriff A. C. Burk.

The sheriff also returned George B. Ricklick, formerly of Minnesota, wanted here in connection with theft of a car belonging to J. B. Mullinix on November 19. Ricklick was picked up in Redding, Calif., where he was arrested following an accident while he was driving the Mullinix car near here several days ago.

Paulson, who served as English instructor at the state training school for boys during the school year of 1938-39, was indicted on three counts involving boy inmates of the training school. He was arrested by Los Angeles police two weeks ago, and was obtained by Sheriff Burk on habeas corpus proceedings rather than as the result of a formal extradition hearing before Governor Culbert Olson of California.

Ricklick, who waived extradition, told officers yesterday of his progress into California after he had taken the Mullinix car. He traded car accessories for gasoline during his trip, and also accepted small amounts from hitch hikers whom he picked up to help purchase fuel.

He was arrested after he had crashed into a bus while driving down a long hill. The car was badly damaged in the accident, but both Ricklick and three hitch hiker companions with him at the time were not badly hurt. The latter were left with authorities at Redding.

### Former Soldiers Schedule Meeting

#### Old Third Oregon Regiment to Celebrate Dec. 9 in Portland

"Twenty-two Years After" will be celebrated by members of the 162d Infantry association, Saturday, December 9, when the group meets at 6:30 p. m. in annual banquet and reunion at the East Side WOW hall, Southeast 9th and Alder streets, in Portland. The wartime regiment was the former Old Third Oregon, and the occasion will mark the anniversary of the regiment's sailing from Long Island, N.Y. December 11, 1917, for overseas service.

Prominent military and civic leaders of Oregon will take part in the program, including a broadcast program speech by the commanding general of the 41st division. Invited guests include two former colonels of the regiment, former Governor Charles H. Martin, and Colonel Cleland C. McLaughlin, Brigadier General Thomas E. Rilea and David H. Hazen who served as a war correspondent with the regiment in France.

Elaborate entertainment plans have been set up to continue all evening, and the regimental band rated one of the best in the AEF will be present and play the tunes so popular in 1917-18.

Hundreds of former members of the war-time regiment will attend from various cities in Oregon and Washington, drawn from companies which includes the medical corps, supply company, headquarters and machine gun company and line companies B, C, D, E, F, H, all of Portland; A of McMinnville, G of Oregon City, M of Salem, L of Dallas, K of Corvallis and I of Woodburn. Members who served on the Mexican border in 1916 will also attend the reunion of this famous regiment.

The local committee headed by Jake Fuhrer, Laurence A. Brown, Ferris Abbott, E. M. Rauch, Jack Bartlett and Phil Ringle is making arrangements for participation of M company of Salem. Tickets can be brought at Ladd and Bush bank from Mr. Fuhrer.

### Christmas Season Noted in Stores

#### Display of Toys and Gifts Mark Windows of Salem Business Houses

Starting this week, Salem mothers will notice a decided improvement in the behavior of their children. For, heralding the coming of Santa Claus, stores throughout the city are now opening elaborate toy sections.

In discussing current trends in toys, G. Vandenberg, manager of Sears, Roebuck & Co., said that toy manufacturers must at all times be as alert to trends and styles as dress manufacturers.

"It is surprising," said Mr. Vandenberg, "to what degree children are style minded when selecting toys. It is a fundamental in the toy business that to be successful a toy must be a miniature of something that the child has seen and with which he is familiar. Toy automobiles, for instance, must follow in exact detail the improvements made by the automobile industry. Trains, too, follow this same trend as proven by the toy streamlined locomotives and coaches identical in appearance to the new speed trains of the modern railroad."

Illustrating further, Mr. Vandenberg explained that toy kitchen stoves have followed step by step the evolution of real stoves. Toy telephones are now the grade type with dial, and pianos for children are mostly baby grands rather than the upright.

Current events also exert a powerful influence on the toy industry, the Sears manager said. After Lindbergh's famous flight in 1927, replicas of toy "Spirit of St. Louis" airplanes were demanded by every child interested in aviation.

Toys made of indestructible rubber are a recent development in the toy industry which this season is expected to influence buying to a considerable extent for they have the advantage of being unbreakable and of having no sharp corners to mar floors or furniture.

### Planning Council To Meet Dec. 6

**UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 23**—Opportunity to profit from the city planning experience of midwestern cities will be available to Salem citizens and city planners through a meeting to be held in the council chambers of the Salem city hall on Wednesday evening, December 6, at 7:30 o'clock. In charge of arrangements is Hedda Swart,

chairman of the Salem planning and zoning commission. Discussion of such problems as metropolitan planning, highway routing and zoning will be led by Charles B. Bennett, city planner of Milwaukee, Wis., and field representative of the American Society of Planning Officials. The society is cooperating with the bureau of municipal research and

service of the University of Oregon and the League of Oregon Cities in sponsoring the meeting. A member of the Wisconsin state planning board and a consultant to the United States housing authority, Mr. Bennett has been active in city planning work since 1926. Among his chief interests are zoning and planning of small cities.
