

Wheat Prices Tumble, Rally

Roosevelt's Tax Remarks, Argentine Estimates Are Factors

CHICAGO, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Wheat prices started upward, then tumbled a cent a bushel or more but finally rallied in a nervous trade today.

Selling that came after mid-session was associated mostly with weakness of securities following the conference of President Roosevelt to consideration being given taxes for defense funds. Buying that righted the market and permitted prices to close only fractionally lower than Wednesday was stimulated largely by reduced estimates of the Argentine wheat crop now being harvested and the US winter crop for 1940.

Wheat closed 1/8 cent below the previous close, December 85 1/2, May 85 1/4.

Mills Buy

Some early buying of wheat was credited to southwestern and milling interests. Cargill Grain Co., leading elevator concern issued the report of a recent survey indicating that while it is impossible to estimate accurately what the winter wheat crop may be, indications point to a much smaller production than in 1933, or probably around 350,000,000 bushels, smallest since the turn of the century. The 1933 crop of 376,618,000 bushels was the smallest in recent years. This year's crop was estimated around 550,000,000 bushels.

B. W. Snow, crop expert, received a report from an Argentine authority indicating that the crop in that country has deteriorated sharply as revealed by early thinning returns. This is due to drought in the season and too much moisture later along with rust. This report reduced estimated production in Argentina to 160,000,000 bushels. A few days ago estimates ranged around 200,000,000 bushels and earlier in the year the forecast was 250,000,000 bushels. Last year Argentina raised 336,000,000, much of which has been carried over.

Jersey Owned by Mt. Angel Breeder Granted High Award by Cattle Club

NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 24.—Lion Farm's Come Son, outstanding sire heading the herd of purebred Jersey cattle owned by Rex Ross, Mount Angel, has just won the highest award granted sires by the American Jersey Cattle club, national organization of Jersey breeders, by qualifying for the title of Superior Sire.

Only Jersey bulls which have ten or more daughters that have met the strict award requirements for production and conformation set by the American Jersey Cattle club, receive the title so far won by less than 45 bulls of the breed. Just previous to becoming a Superior Sire, Lion Farm's Come Son qualified for the silver medal award of the club for the silver medal production records of three of his daughters which made their tests on twice daily milking.

His achievements are particularly significant because in his ten years as a herd sire he has been used in four herds in three different states. When he became a Superior Sire he had 34 daughters which have made official production test records all of which, with two exceptions, were milked only twice daily. Altogether their production records, six of which won medal awards, average 605.57 pounds butterfat, 11,526 pounds milk on a mature equivalent, 365-day basis.

Lion Farm's Come Son and his daughters have often won prizes in the Oregon state fair dairy show where he was twice a blue ribbon winner as a young bull under the ownership of Mr. and Mrs. Thornley and in 1933, placed third for senior get-of-sire under the ownership of Ross.

Salt Creek Opens Fine new School

Wheat-Fed Stock To Be Developed

Experiment Stations Will Operate at Four Oregon Towns

CORVALLIS, Nov. 24.—(AP)—A wheat-fed livestock industry will be developed in experiment stations here, at Union, Burns and Astoria.

The department of agriculture and the Oregon State college experiment stations will cooperate in experiments on feeding of range and dairy cattle, sheep, lambs, calves, swine and poultry.

The agriculture department, acting on the suggestion of Senator McNary and Representative Pierce, will provide 350 tons of wheat.

The program was endorsed by Secretary Wallace, Milo Perkins, head of the federal surplus commodities corporation, A. G. Black, director of marketing for the bureau of agricultural economics, Larry Meyers, marketing assistant, and N. E. Dodd of Baker, director of the AAA western division.

Greater use of wheat in livestock production will assist in disposing of Oregon's 13,000,000 bushels of excess of normal consumption here, Dean William A. Schoonfeld of Oregon State college said.
