Question of Candidates Still Uppermost

The question uppermost in the minds of most individuals, naturally enough, is not when the conventions will be held but who will seek and who will obtain the presidential nominations.

Mr. Roosevelt is keeping his third term intentions to himself. He again admitted with high good humor at a press conference today that he was taking no pleasure in giving reporters opportunity to speculate about those intentions.

As he sat behind the wheel of his blue touring car, a newsmen told him he had "tossed out another piece of bait to us and we leaped out and took it" last Friday at the dedication of the Warm Springs community center. The reference was to the president's remark that the villagers had only a little more than a year left to get a postoffice from the present administration.

FDR Enjoys Baiting Newspaper Reporters

Turning to Mrs. Cooper Lord of New York, a guest at the Warm Springs foundation, who was sitting beside him, the president inquired whether the press was not having a good time.

"They don't miss a trick," she replied.

Mr. Roosevelt agreed, adding with a smile that he was having just as good a time as were reporters. He said the family told him he took an unholly pleasure in sparring with newspapermen on the third term question. And, he said, it was a fact that he did.

sure may cause inconvenience and perhaps loss to neutrals," but that "these measures for helping bring our efforts to a successful issue may well be worth some sacrifice on the part of neutrals."

The latest British loss at sea, meanwhile, was the 2,432-ton steamer *Ugmkouth* which went down with three of her crew of 25 missing. The cause of her sinking was not made known immediately.

Official quarters said they knew nothing of a German official assertion that a British heavy cruiser had been destroyed.

After developments of the day: "Authoritative sources disclosed that Foreign Secretary Lord Halifax had invited Russian Ambassador Ivan Malsky to clarify Moscow's policy regarding Finland."

Food Minister W. S. Vorrison told the house of commons that rationing of butter and bacon would start January 8 with purchases restricted to four ounces. Although sugar will not be rationed at that time, consumers will be asked to restrict purchases to one pound per person.

The air ministry announced substantial reinforcements of fighters over northwestern Germany by royal air force planes.

Klamath Churches To Pay Food Tax

KLAMATH FALLS, Nov. 28—(AP)—Police Judge Carl Cook was instructed by the city council today to warn churches and other organizations that a city ordinance requiring a \$15 yearly license for food establishments would be strictly enforced.

Cook said the ordinance described a food establishment as any place where prepared food was sold or offered for sale to the public for consumption on the premises.

The warning grew out of the local culinary alliance's complaint against a dairyman's association dinner, scheduled for next month at the First Methodist church.

2 New Proposals Offered in Tieup

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 28—(AP)—Two new proposals for immediate reopening of this port, partially closed by a CIO ship clerks strike, were the newest developments tonight in the confused 15-day waterfront tieup.

Governor Culbert L. Olson sought mutual consent of waterfront employers and the clerk's union to operation of the docks, which are owned and leased by the state, on a temporary, impartial basis, by the state harbor board.

Case Settled

Unions Propose Aims for Season

Wages, Conditions in Fish Canning Industry Are Subject of Meet

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 28—(AP)—A conference of unions interested in the Alaska salmon industry was concluded today with the approval of "stream-lined" demands that will be presented to employers in the spring.

The conference, called by the Maritime Federation of the Pacific, said the demands would include guaranteed seasonal wages for all workers, and uniform wage and picket clauses.

Guaranteed seasonal wages will be asked, the conference said, to "thwart the packers' policy of speed-up and curtailment of operations during the canning season to negate gains made by workers through their agreements with the industry."

A resolution demanding federal relief for those who lose employment because of fishing curtailments in the Bristol Bay area was adopted.

The bureau of fisheries has ordered a 50 per cent reduction in Bristol Bay operations for conservation purposes. Approximately 3,000 men will be affected. Another resolution "condemned" the waterfront employers, the Associated Fishermen and Mayor Angelo Rossi of San Francisco for "their vicious attack against the maritime unions and Harry Bridges."

A proposed coastwise labor conference in Juneau, Alaska, some time in January was endorsed.

College Airplane Plan Is Approved

MOSCOW, Idaho, Nov. 28—(AP)—Dean J. E. Buchanan of the University of Idaho engineering department said today final approval of the joint Idaho-Washington state college student pilot training program had been approved by the civil aeronautics authority and classes at the airport would start tomorrow.

The Wallace flying service of Spokane has six planes and instructors at the Moscow-Pullman airport and had received all necessary certificates for starting the instruction, he added.

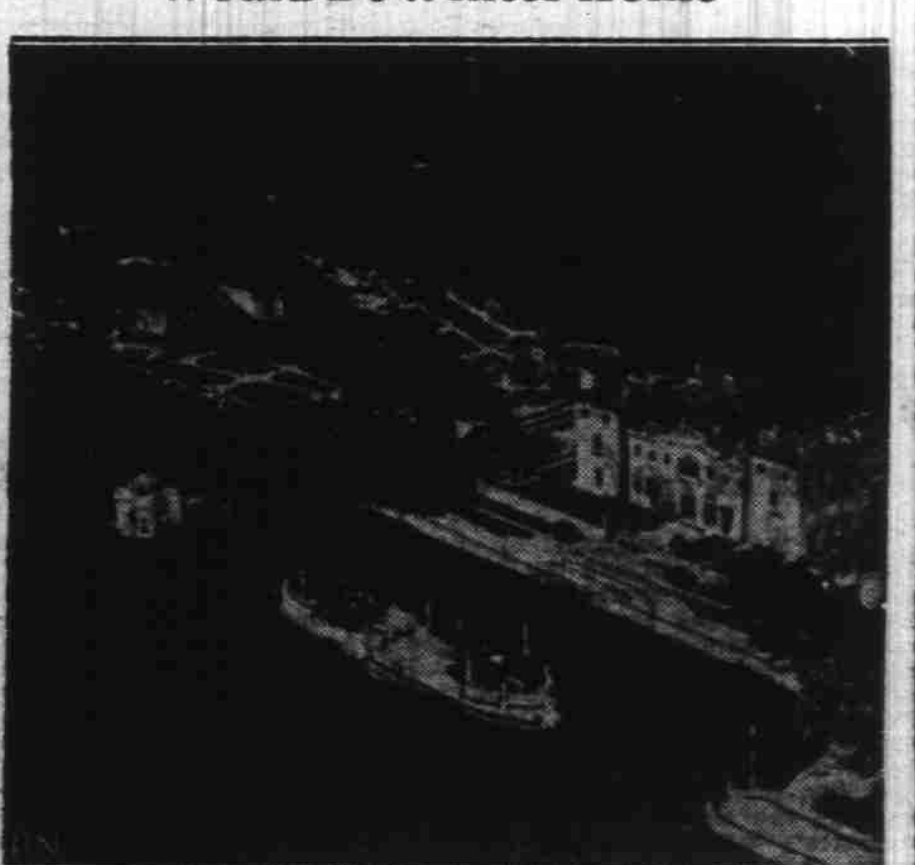
Sixty students from the two institutions will learn to fly.

Spokane Passes Milk Ordinance

SPOKANE, Nov. 28—(AP)—The Spokane city council passed yesterday an ordinance forbidding any but pasteurized milk to be sold inside the city.

The vote for the ordinance was unanimous after two hours of debate, in which the arguments of 87 small dairymen selling raw milk and the petitions of 3,000 customers were overruled. The ordinance will become effective next July 1.

State Supreme Court Goes to Bat For Beavers After Circuit Judge Orders Dams Torn Out in Malheur

A group of Oregon beavers won the commendation of the Oregon state supreme court here Tuesday.

Paul Stewart, a resident of the Crane Creek district of Malheur county, constructed three dams to prevent erosion on his land but all of them washed out within a short time. He then obtained 16 beavers from the state game commission and they started to work.

The result was a permanent dam. Lloyd L. Johnson, living on Crane creek below Stewart's home, later filed suit in the Malheur county circuit court in which he charged that the dam was depriving him of water for his irrigation purposes. He sought \$650 damages.

Circuit Judge Charles W. Ellis ruled against the beavers and ordered Stewart to do away with the dam. Stewart refused and was found in contempt of court.

Chief Justice Bean, in an opinion here Tuesday, reversed Judge Ellis. He held that Stewart, with the assistance of the beavers, was within his rights in constructing a dam to prevent the land erosion.

In another opinion, the supreme court reversed Circuit Judge R. J. Green, Union county, and held in favor of William and Richard Northrup, who had appealed from a decree by Mary E. Wright in connection with a mortgage foreclosure.

Maverick Case Jury Selected

Corrupt Practice Charges to Be Aired Before Texas Court

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Nov. 28—(AP)—Selection of a jury to try Mayor M. A. O'Brien on a charge of paying the poll tax for R. J. O'Brien began today.

Payment of the tax enabled O'Brien, member of a garment workers' union, to vote in the election in which Maverick was elected.

Venue men were questioned closely concerning their official histories, their views on labor unions and their acquaintance with Maverick or other members of the city administration. Attorneys for the reform mayor and former new deal congressman asked them whether they ever had belonged to any organization seeking to bring about his defeat or recall.

The prospective jurors also were examined as to whether they would impose a penitentiary sentence if convinced Maverick was guilty.

Judge Bryce Ferguson threw out 20 of the 25 names in the indictment. District Attorney John R. Shook insisted, however, the state's case had not been badly hurt.

Two of the remaining counts alleged Maverick and three others paid O'Brien's tax of \$1.75 last January, and three other counts accused him of conspiring to pay the tax.

The mayor, who said Cleveland faced a \$700,000 deficiency in aiding the needy through December, declared no one would be allowed to starve.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 28—(AP)—The steamer W. R. Chamberlain, Jr., was picketed here today by the Masters, Mates and Pilots association, an AFL affiliate, and the Columbia pilots association.

William Fischer, union business agent, charged the ship used non-union pilots.

Mrs. Nina B. Keswick, manager of the Chamberlain Steamship company, charged the dispute was over jurisdiction between two unions. Union pilots are used on Chamberlain ships, she said.

Portland's Levy Reaches New High

PORTLAND, Nov. 28—(AP)—The 1940 consolidated tax levy for Portland amounts to \$2.4 mills, the highest on record, Secretary R. C. Flanders of the Multnomah county tax supervising and conservation commission revealed today.

The levy for the city, county, school district, port and dock commission was \$9.9, exclusive of the 2.5 state levy. Last year's consolidated levy was \$9.5 mills.

Autos Kill 219

PORTLAND, Nov. 28—(AP)—A total of 219 persons were killed in traffic accidents from Jan. 1, 1934, through Dec. 31, 1938, a five-year traffic toll, traffic bureau, plotted today by the traffic bureau, showed. Of that number 179 were injured fatally at night, 46 in daylight hours; 6 to 10 p. m., were the most dangerous hours. December the most dangerous month.

Precious Paper Arrives in US

Magna Carta Turned Over for Safe-Keeping at Capital Ceremony

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28—(AP)—The British government, which burned the American capital 125 years ago, today turned over to the United States for safe-keeping one of its most precious pieces of paper—Magna Carta.

The ceremony was impressive and heavy with coat-tailed dignity.

At 3:57 p. m., the Right Honorable the Earl of Salisbury, Lord of the Treasury, stepped to the 47 stone steps of the library of congress.

Somewhere between the first and last step he handed over Magna Carta to Sidney Grant Wood, head of the Canadian-English pavilion of the New York world's fair. Magna Carta, in its container, was heavy.

Red of face and breathing deeply, Wood reached the balcony and the metal case in which the famous document was kept, guarded night and day, opposite the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence.

Lord Salisbury ended the ceremonies by locking Magna Carta in its case and handing the key to Librarian MacLachlan, MacLachlan dropped the key into his right pants pocket and smiled.

"In order to prevent confusion in the Chrysler plant, employees to work and preparing the plants for opening on Thursday the UAW has agreed to withdraw its picket lines Wednesday morning and the corporation has agreed to close the Dodge main, Dodge truck and Dodge forage plants on Wednesday to all employees except the foreman."

"The union conferees agreed to submit a draft of the contract to the membership Wednesday for ratification in an effort to enable the employees to return to work Thursday."

School Buildings Sought by Grange

Request for Use Presented to Board by Master Zero Polaire

Use of the new senior high school building, including the cafeteria, as headquarters for the state grange convention next June was requested by Zero Polaire, master-elect of the Salem grange, in an appearance before the Salem school board last night. The matter was referred to committee for study.

The board also received a proposal from nine local printing houses that the school district consider cooperation with a suggested pricing bureau to fix the cost of printing for the school, the city, the county and other public bodies.

Contract with the Marion county non-high board for tuition pupils was approved on the basis of an \$850,932.18 valuation on the superior and junior high school buildings and \$115,751.10 on equipment.

Bids for installing modern lighting in Washington grade school were referred to the finance committee.

The district has just made two payments on the 1935 construction program bonds which with interest totaled \$62,862.50, Clerk C. C. Ward reported.

Striking Workers Seek to Return

ASHEVILLE, NC, Nov. 28—(AP)—C. S. Walters, vice president of the Carolina Power and Light company, announced early this morning that employees of his company who walked out of their jobs and left this resort city of 55,000 without power, had requested the right to return to their jobs.

The employees, who left their posts in protest against refusal of company officials to grant a closed shop, added to the restoration of current to the city, which was thrown into almost total darkness just before last midnight.

Labor Relations Will Be Issues

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 28—(AP)—Wages and hours, labor relations and highways will be the principal issues at the next congressional session, Representative Mott (R. Ore.) said yesterday.

He told the chamber of commerce he would ask the next congress for an additional \$1,000,000 to enlarge the Tongue Point naval air base from two squadrons of patrol bombers to three.

Congress acted as an independent law-making body "for the first time in seven years" at its last regular session, Mott said.

Fraternity Takes Paralysis Victim

PORTLAND, Nov. 28—(AP)—Lawyer Van M. Mott, his University of Oregon football career ruined by infantile paralysis, had at least one ambition realized today as he wore a Beta Theta Pi fraternity pin.

Van Mott, stricken last summer, was initiated in the fraternity and presented with a pin the other day by 25 Beta brothers who chipped in to buy it and pay his initiation fee.

He starred as an end on the Oregon freshman team.
