Jury's Report Is Due Today

Inquiry Into Alleged Fund Shortages Nearly Finished

Report of the Marion county grand jury on a number of routine criminal cases as well as the investigation of alleged shortages on the books of City Recorder A. Warren Jones may be presented to the circuit court today, though Deputy District Attorney Joseph Felton yesterday indicated that the jury might find it necessary to delay its appearance because of routine matters which have come up lately. For this reason, the jury may hold its report over to a day early next week.

The jury has met every day this week since Tuesday and in that time considered a number of routine criminal cases as well as the matter of the city recorder, according to District Attorney Lyle J. Page.

Albany Leads In Job Placements

Turkey Industry Helps in Linn County Office; 1603 Situated

Albany led the 21 offices of the Oregon state employment service in job placements during November, due in part to the constantly expanding turkey industry that is sending thousands of holiday birds into every corner of the nation.

With orders at hand for more turkeys for Christmas and New Years, turkey picking jobs in the valley towns were expected to start again next week.

A report of L. C. Stoll, director of the state employment service, showed that Albany office provided 1603 jobs in November of which 1436 were in private industry, 182 supplementary and only 47 public. Portland was second with 973 placements, of which 599 were private, 183 supplementary and 291 public. Klamath Falls was third, Eugene fourth, Roseburg fifth, Newport sixth and Ontario seventh.

Generally improved conditions were reflected in the year's decrease in active files from 30,419 to 25,327 registered jobsites, while new applications taken last month were 9567 compared with 7666 for November, 1932. Another encouraging feature of the report was the increase of private placements from 1377 last year to 4774, while public jobs dropped from 1224 to 969.
