

Edward F. Clower Dies at Hospital

SILVERTON—Edward Francis Clower, 73, died at the Deaconess hospital Thursday morning. He had been confined there for the past three years. Funeral services will be held Monday at 3 o'clock from the Ekman Memorial funeral home with the Rev. Edward Terry in charge.

Rev. Clower was born January 25, 1866, at Riasa, Ill. He attended Blackburn university at Carlinville, Ill., and in 1891 married Lillian Wilton at Medora. In 1912 he was admitted to the West Nebraska conference of the Methodist church, and later to the Wyoming conference. At the time of his death he was a member of the Idaho conference.

Rev. Clower had served as pastor in a number of Oregon Methodist congregations including those of Canyon City, John Day, Fraile City, Haines, North Powder, Joseph and Vale. Because of ill health he retired in 1930 and came to Silverton to be with his daughter, who was then Miss Elaine Clower, a teacher in the Silverton schools.

His Masonic connections included master Mason at Dysart, Iowa, in 1895; member of the Kommerer lodge No. 33 AF and AM at Kemmerer, Wyo., at the time of his death; a member of the 1915 class of Wyoming Consistory No. 1 and of Scottish Rite at Cheyenne, Wyo.; also of the Korala temple of Mystic Shrine at Rawlins, Wyo.

Survivors include the widow, Lillian Clower at Silverton; one son, Sidney George Clower at Wendell, Idaho; the daughter, Mrs. Harrison Fischer (Elaine Clower) at Etna, Calif.; one granddaughter, Mildred Clower at Wendell; a sister, Annie Keas, at Chanute, Kans., and a brother, John L. Clower, at Morrisonville, Ill.
