Inspection Shows Linn Jail Good

ALBANY — Inspection of Linn county's new jail, completed by Bernard Anderson, federal prison inspector, shows that the jail is entirely up to requirements of federal demands and is now ready to house any inmates who run amok of the law. So efficiently is the jail constructed, that federal prisoners could be housed therein should the need arise.

The new jail occupies the top story of the new county courthouse, and the construction is such that it would be next to impossible for a prisoner to escape. Deputy Sheriff Mike Southard and Mrs. Southard are moving to the apartment next to the jail, from their quarters in the old jail. As soon as they get moved the work of tearing down the old jail, bought by Sam Frager at auction for \$40, will start. Frager bought all but the heating plant which the county court retained, and which will be moved to the county farm.

Completion of the new court house is to be made by March 1, an extension of time having been given the contractors.
