## Lloyd McEarl Gets 2 Years

### Parole Granted on Advice Of Sheriff; Ambrose Bail Is Set

Judge L. H. McMahan yesterday sentenced Lloyd McEarl to two years in state prison after he had pleaded guilty to the charge of doing an act manifestly tending to contribute to the delinquency of a minor, and granted parole to the convict on recommendation of the district attorney.

The judge also set bail of Bobby Ambrose at \$250. Ambrose is held on a non-support charge pending inquiry by the grand jury.
