

Friend of Hitler Back in England

Unity's Father Says She
Doesn't Even Know
of German War

LONDON, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Unity Valkyrie Freeman-Mitford, friend of Adolf Hitler, came home to a quiet country village tonight without knowing there was war between her homeland and the fushrer's Germany.

While applecheeked wives of tenant farmers greeted the wan, thin Unity with "It's lovely to have you back," Baron Redesdale admitted, "My daughter, poor child, does not even know that England is at war."

Tired and haggard, the baron cringed as an idler at the village of High Wycombe, home of the Redesdales, shouted "Hell Hitler" when the green ambulance rumbled by.

The village, 20 miles from London, was plastered with newspaper headlines announcing the strange return of the sick girl from Germany. She could see them from the ambulance window.

"My daughter has stood the journey very well, but she still is very ill," the British peer said. "She is unable to see anyone and must have perfect quiet."

As police pressed a mass roundup of extremists charged with being dangerous to the state, the date adopted without amendment the emergency measure previously approved by the Diet (lower house).

At the same time the dial passed a companion act for dealing with "offenses against the state" which will go to the senate tomorrow. The dial then resumed until Jan. 11.

Fair Association Seeks Legislation

STOCKTON, Calif., Jan. 4.—(AP)—The Western Fair Association decided today to increase the amount of money to be spent in its legislative program. The association's convention drew 200 delegates representing nearly 100 fairs, exhibits and fests in six western states.

Because of the importance of legislative work in promoting the best interests of the association's

programs the organization hereafter will spend one-half of one per cent of funds available to fairs instead of one tenth of one per cent.

Officers for the coming year will be elected tomorrow. States reps seated at the convention are California, Oregon, Washington, Utah, Arizona and Nevada.

Sun Shines Again On Pacific Coast

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 4.—(AP)—The sun shone again today in the far west after several days of general rains and unsettled weather, but the United States weather bureau said it apparently was only a between storms.

A new storm moving eastward from Hawaii was expected to reach the coast tomorrow, bringing light rains from southern California to Canada Friday and Saturday. Light snows were forecast for the higher mountain ranges during the same period.

Today saw the end of a storm that brought several inches of much-needed rain to northern and central California and some snow to the Sierra Nevada.

New Government Session Object

TOKYO, Jan. 4.—(AP)—High military authorities opened today a conference which Japanese observers believed was one of the final steps toward organization of a government for the conquered territories of China under the Chinese leader Wang Ching-wei.

The war of office general staff and officers who recently completed a special fact-finding assignment in China participated. The sessions are expected to last several days, to be followed by a report and possibly a final decision to be presented to the cabinet.

Nazi Wins Round Over Deportation

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Erich Rix, native-born German who fears enforced return to his birthplace will result in death, today won his first battle to prevent deportation.

District Immigration Commissioner John McGrath said he would recommend that deportation proceedings be dropped against the seaman, who said he was placed in a concentration camp in Germany and later came to the United States to fight the Nazis.

McGrath's recommendation will be sent to the department of labor in Washington, D.C., where a final decision will be made.

Japanese Shot

TOKYO, Jan. 4.—(Friday)—(AP)—Domei (Japanese news agency) reported today from Peiping that an American sentry had shot and seriously wounded a Japanese soldier. No details were given.

Elopement Closes Hectic Courtship

New York Socialite Uses
Ruse to Meet Groom
for Ceremony

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Eileen Herrick and George Lowther, 3rd, eloped today with the happy announcement they would wed tomorrow in an undisclosed hamlet far, far from New York.

The sweethearts met and fled after Miss Herrick sauntered away from her home in the swank East Side—on the ruse she was going to "take her dog for a walk."

The elopement abruptly climaxed a cafe society romance—a love enlivened by front page headlines, extraordinary court action, and public parental frowns of Mr. and Mrs. Walter R. Herrick, the 20-year-old socialite's parents.

That the frown had deepened was indicated by a New York police report that Herrick, former park commissioner and head of a distinguished old New York family, had complained to them that his daughter was being "held against her will."

Eli Johnson, Lowther's attorney, who twice helped the 30-year-old insurance broker to produce his Juliet in court via the unromantic route of "habeas corpus," termed Herrick's reported complaint "nonsense."

Two Still Lost in Apartment Blaze

MINNEAPOLIS, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Two persons were still unaccounted for today as the death toll in the Mariborough apartment hotel fire reached 19.

There were two unidentified bodies of men in the county morgue, and there was a possibility they might be those of the two persons missing since fire swept through the three-story hotel early yesterday.

The 19th victim, Steven Brazzil, 54, died in a hospital today. Twenty-five persons were still receiving hospital treatment tonight.

Farley Proposed Mate for Garner

MILWAUKEE, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Wisconsin supporters of John Nance Garner for president today joined a movement to enlist James A. Farley as his running mate.

About 48 democrats from the state's 10 congressional districts attended the first state-wide meeting called by the Wisconsin Garner for President club. The majority was reported to favor drafting Farley to make the race for vice-president.

Fraternity Picks Site in Alberta

EDMONTON, Jan. 4.—(CP)—For the first time in the history of the University of Alberta, an international fraternity has chosen the U of A campus as the locale for an annual conference. Delegates from four American

universities and two Canadian colleges, one of them Alberta, will meet here Feb. 16 and 17 for the annual conference of province seven of Delta Upsilon fraternity. Universities sending delegates include Washington State, Washington, Oregon State, Oregon and the University of British Columbia.

Sub-Zero Weather Strikes Midwest

CHICAGO, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Sub zero cold weather overspread much of the Midwest tonight. Caught in the grasp of the frigid wave were Iowa, Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Nebraska, Montana, Wisconsin, and part of Kansas, Missouri and Illinois.

The mercury in several Minnesota, Iowa and North and South Dakota towns failed to rise above the zero mark during the day and skidded down gradually tonight.

The general forecast for tomorrow was fair weather and continued cold.

Canada Volunteers Would Aid Finns

MONTREAL, Jan. 5.—(Friday)—(AP)—A division of Royal Canadian mounted police, sourdoughs, prospectors, trappers and Indians, may be formed in Canada to go to fight for the Finns, the Montreal Gazette reported today.

Quoting "reliable sources," the paper said the force would be selected from volunteers who would find conditions in Finland "similar to their own northwest territories, the Yukon and the Hudson Bay region."

Woman Is Killed In Auto Accident

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Jan. 4.—(AP)—Mrs. Hazel Smith, 25, of Madison City, Wash., was injured today in a collision of three automobiles 12 miles west of here.

The woman's husband, Virgil H. Mason, 42, and four others were injured, none seriously. Highway Patrolman Harry Starr said Smith's car, a second machine driven by William R. Conlita of Sacramento, and a third car driven by Mrs. Mary Hudson, 39, of Roseville, Calif., collided on the highway.

Noted Composer, Violinist Dead

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Madame Maia Bang Hohn, 60, concert violinist, author of 20 books on music, and lecturer on the maracas, died today after a short illness.

Norwegian by birth, she was known in many European countries and many parts of the United States. She was the daughter of Anton Christian Bang, a former premier of Norway. She fled with Leopold Auer from the bolshevik revolution in Russia to the United States in 1919.

Finn Fund Sent

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover today transferred to Finnish agencies the fourth \$100,000 collected by the Finnish Relief Fund of which he is national chairman.

Guardsmen Called To Halt Lynching

Accused Negro Is Sought
by Mob After One
White Man Slain

MEADVILLE, Miss., Jan. 4.—(AP)—A company of national guardsmen arrived in the nearby community of Knoxville tonight in an effort to prevent the lynching of a negro slayer-suspect sought through the dense and gloomy Homochitto national forest by a posse of 100 Mississippians.

The negro is wanted for the slaying of one white man and the wounding of two others Monday night.

The hunt for one negro was slightly delayed tonight as the possumen awaited the arrival of bloodhounds before beginning a relentless, night-long search among the miles of pine trees.

The troops were sent to the scene by Governor Hugh White. The soldiers were stationed along the bridges and roads leading into Knoxville while the possumen beat through the forest.

Hospital to Get Big Game Profits

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 4.—(AP)—A preliminary report on proceeds of the annual east-west charity football game held here New Year's day for the benefit of the Shrine hospital for crippled children indicated today the institution would receive more than \$50,000.

Although rain kept many of the fans at home, the gross sale of tickets reached \$91,000, or about \$6000 below capacity of Kezar stadium. Ticket Manager William L. Hughson announced today. Sale of programs brought in an additional \$2000 he said.

P-I Photographer Favored ANG Head

SEATTLE, Jan. 4.—(AP)—The Seattle unit executive committee tonight nominated Frank (Slim) Lynch, Post-Intelligencer photographer, for the presidency of the American Newspaper Guild to succeed the late Heywood Brown.

Lynch was one of the two men whose dismissal precipitated the 1936 strike which shut down the Hearst-owned Post-Intelligencer for several weeks. He was later reinstated.

New Frequencies Given 650 Radios

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—(AP)—

The federal communications commission has tentatively assigned new frequencies to between 650 and 700 radio stations in the United States, officials said today. The new frequencies will be-

come effective at a date to be set by the commission before December 28, 1940, a year after ratification by Mexico of the North American regional broadcast agreement. Mexico's ratification

put the agreement into effect, since Canada, Cuba, Haiti, and the United States, other participants in the 1937 Havana radio conference, previously had ratified it.

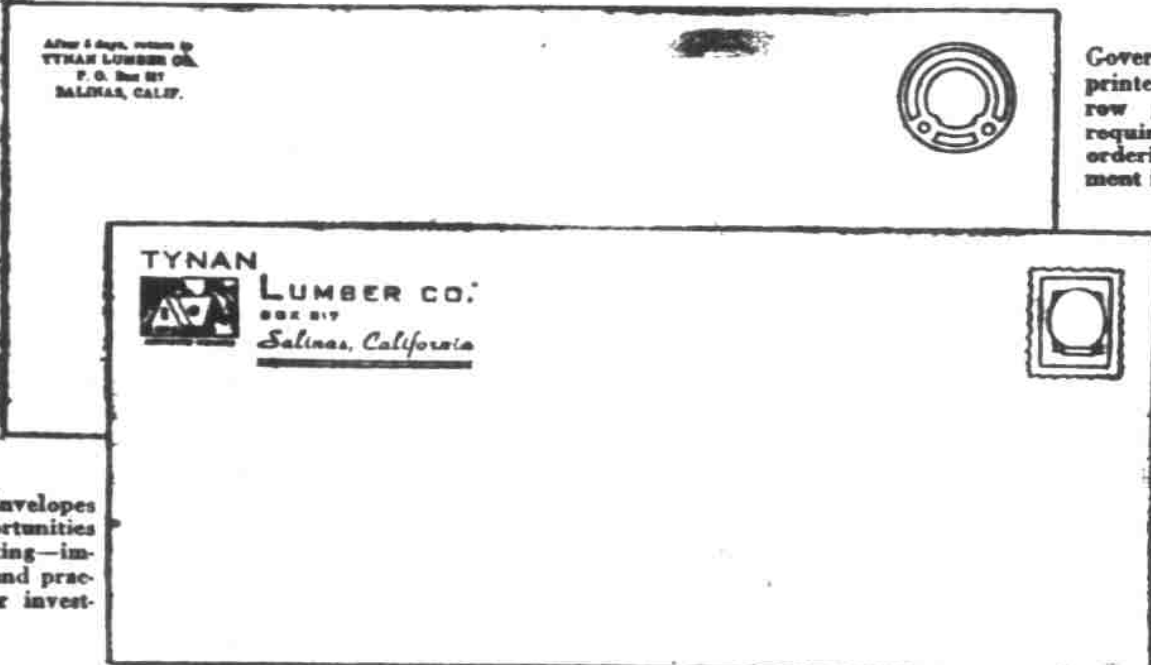
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
