Plane Burning Damage Asked

Suit for \$8900 Is Filed in Circuit Court Against Municipal Airport

Suit for \$8900 damages to three airplanes destroyed in a fire at the municipal airport hangar September 8, 1939, was started in circuit court yesterday by J. H. Garnjobst, owner of one of the planes, against Frank G. Andrews.

Andrews, at the time a pilot for the state board of forestry, is charged in the complaint with negligently causing the fire when he allegedly set loose an emergency flare from the forestry department's plane while it was in the hangar.

The fire was extinguished before damaging the hangar. Destroyed planes mentioned in the complaint are a four-place Waco owned by Ernest T. Eldridge and valued at \$2400, a Savoia-Marchetti amphibian owned by William H. Turner and valued at \$2000 and the plaintiff's \$4500 four-place Fairchild plane.

Andrews, it is understood, is no longer employed by the forestry department as pilot.

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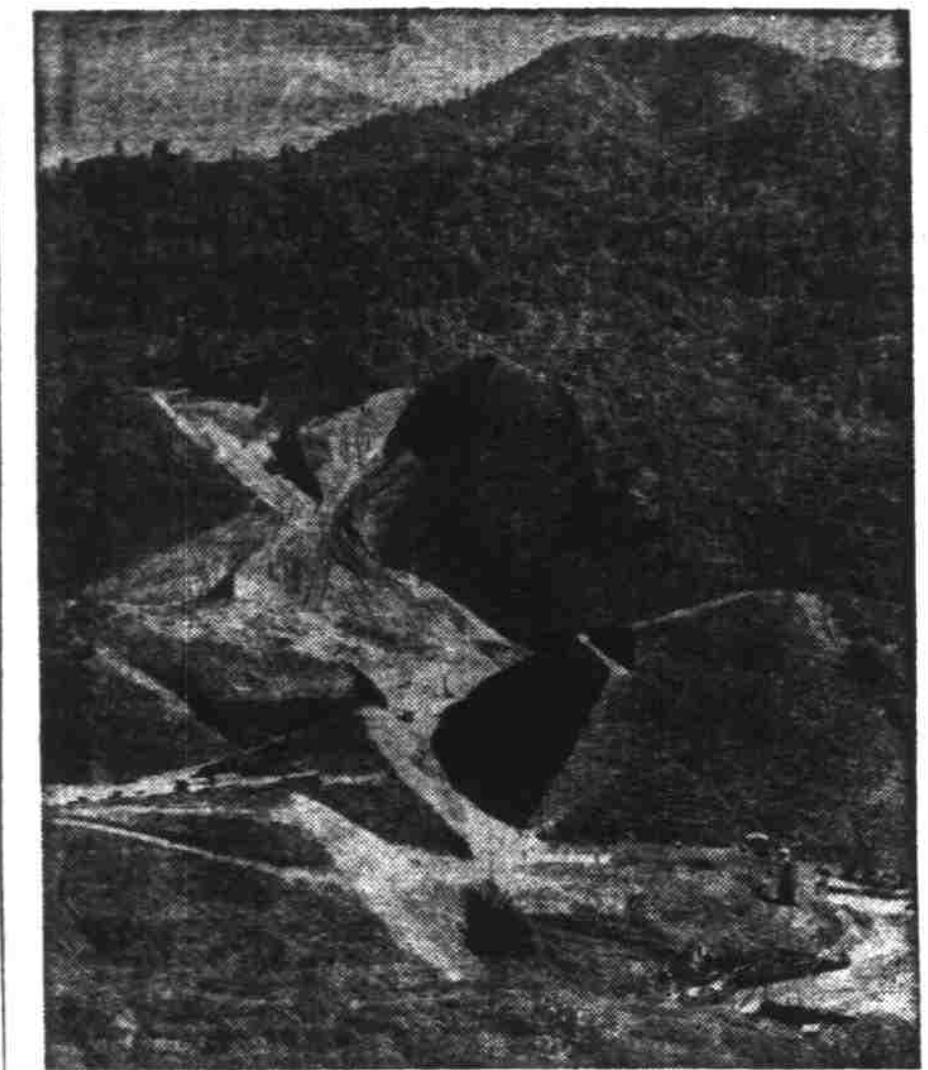
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Man-Made Canyons at Shasta Project

Federal Workers To Report Wages

State Income Tax Catches US Employees Under new Statute

Compensation received by federal employees, either resident or stationed in Oregon, for the year 1939, must be reported on state income tax returns to be filed with the state tax commission here on or before April 1.

Residents are required to report their entire income in the form of salaries and wages, regardless of whether received for service within or without the state. Non-residents are required to report salaries and wages received for services within the state.

Under the Oregon income tax law married persons living together for the full year are allowed an exemption of \$1500. In case of single persons, or married individuals not living together, the exemption is \$800. A credit of \$300 is allowed for each dependent.

Among federal officers and employees required to file state income tax returns for 1939 are those of all departments, commissions, bureaus and agencies of the national government, such as the postoffice department and departments of the interior, agriculture and commerce.

There also is included the personnel of the army, navy, marine corps, coast guard, public health service and members of the national guard receiving pay from the federal government.

Pensions and retirement allowances not specifically exempted from state taxation by statute also are subject to the state income tax act. Officers and employees of corporations whose stock is owned by the United States likewise are subject to the state income tax on compensation received for services rendered to such companies.

Resident officers and employees of the federal government are obligated to report for 1939 as in past years all other income items in addition to their salaries and wages received from the United States.

Penalty and interest will accrue on returns not filed by April 1.

Captain Relates Hazardous Voyage

Pennsylvania's Crossing of Atlantic Beseet by Difficulties

Surviving a 15-hour hurricane which inflicted heavy damage and then for a climax, successfully eluding submarines and avoiding mines without the aid of the promised naval convoy, were some of the experiences of Captain C. L. Brown of the tanker Pennsylvania, which reached Bordeaux, France, with the last cargo of crude oil before the neutrality law went into effect banning American vessels from war zones, according to letters received from Captain Brown by his daughter, Mrs. Harold E. Allen, 245 South 15th street.

Hurricane damage caused the SS Pennsylvania to lose 80 tons of fresh water, making it necessary to use salt water in the boiler; the drinking water supply was almost gone before the tanker reached Bordeaux. After arrival in the war zone those aboard the Pennsylvania saw one vessel sunk ten miles astern and another four miles to starboard but, receiving no SOS, did not investigate.

Throughout the voyage extreme vigilance was exercised and lifeboats were kept ready to use and fully provisioned. No submarines were sighted by the Pennsylvania. Similar vigilance was maintained on the return voyage although there was less danger of attack as the tanker returned empty.

She would have been a valuable prize if captured en route to France as petroleum products are precious in Europe. Gasoline sells at 90 cents a gallon in France and \$1.50 in Italy; in Germany civilians can get none.

Delayed by storms and the necessity for making repairs before the return voyage, the Pennsylvania, owned by the Texas company, was three months making its last round trip. Mrs. Allen said. The nurses will observe and assist in all functions performed by the Marion county department of health. The first morning they spent familiarizing themselves with the health education program. A nursing conference which included all the nurses was Thursday afternoon.

2 State Officers Are Reappointed

Aviation Training To Start April 1

Aviation instruction at the Salem municipal airport under the auspices of the civil aeronautics authority will start about April 1 with Lee U. Eyerly in charge. It was announced Thursday following the decision of the Salem chamber of commerce board of directors Wednesday night to provide local sponsorship.

Classes of 50 or less for ground instruction will be organized, these students being required to pay fees not in excess of \$10. Following this course examinations will select ten who are to receive the scholarship flight training.

Only fees for the \$5 to 50 hours of actual flight instruction being \$6 for a medical examination and \$14 for insurance. The government pays the training center \$200.

The 72 hours of ground instruction will consist of six hours per week of evening classes over a 12-weeks period. Application blanks are at Eyerly's office at the airport.
