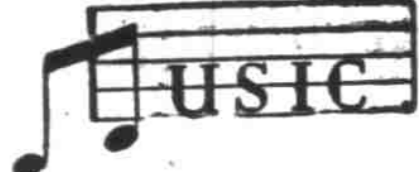


Mrs. Wiesko Luncheon Hostess

STUFFED PORK ROAST
Pork shoulder, about 4 lbs.
2 cups dried apples
1 cup crushed pineapple
2 cups bread crumbs
3 tablespoons fat
1/2 cup boiling water
1/2 teaspoon celery salt
1 tablespoon brown sugar
Salt to taste

Ask your butcher to carefully remove the bone from the shoulder. This will leave a nice pocket to stuff. Wipe meat inside and out with damp cloth to remove or after roasting.

APPLE PUDDING
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup butter
1 egg
1 cup flour.
1 teaspoon each soda, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg
4 tart apples
Chop apples, not too fine, mix all ingredients together and bake in a shallow pan for about 30 minutes or until apples are done. Serve with whipped cream or this sauce, hot or cold.

SWEET SAUCE
1/2 cup water
1 cup brown sugar
1 teaspoon butter
Bring to a boil and thicken with cornstarch to desired thickness.
