Paulson Trial Set January 29

Ex-Training School Head Pleads Innocent to Morals Charges

Mark A. Paulson pleaded innocent to three indictments charging him with a crime against nature and other morals offenses allegedly involving boys at the Oregon state training school at Woodburn when he appeared yesterday before Judge L. H. McMahan.

The court ordered that his trial be set for January 29-31, and that \$3000 bail previously posted be continued. Paulson has been at large since he was released several weeks ago from the state hospital, where he had been committed on order of the court for a sanity examination. Judge McMahan also sentenced Charles Howard, who pleaded guilty to possession of property stolen last July from a local store, to a year in the county jail, and gave him credit for time already served since July 16 when he was first committed.

Grand Jury Will Get Robbery Case

Frank Wilson, his wife Juanita, and James L. Sterling, all charged with theft of automobile accessories and a radio from the Allen Brothers garage of Silvertown on December 27, were bound over to the grand jury yesterday after appearing before Justice Alf O. Nelson in Silvertown justice court. Following their arraignment, during which they entered no plea, the prisoners were returned to Salem, where they were held in the county jail in lieu of \$5000 bail apiece.

District Attorney Lyle J. Page yesterday indicated that he would take no immediate action against the trio, who were arrested in Olympia, Wash., recently, pending report on their fingerprints, copies of which have been forwarded to the department of justice in Washington.

The Wilson and Sterling are thought to have been previously connected with burglaries in Washington, California and Arizona.

70,000 US Income Tax Blanks Mailed

J. W. Maloney, collector of internal revenue, announces that approximately 70,000 income forms for 1939 are now being mailed to Oregon corporations, individuals, partnerships, estates and trusts who filed such forms for the preceding year. Maloney pointed out that this is done as an accommodation only, and that the requirement for filing of returns does not depend upon the receipt of the forms. Persons and organizations who did not file for 1939 but who are required to file for 1939 may secure forms from the office of the collector, room 222, Customhouse, Portland, Oregon.

Compensation paid to employees of the state, counties, cities, school districts and other political subdivisions will be subject to federal income tax for 1939, under provisions of the public salary tax act which becomes effective as to all such compensation paid on or after January 1, 1939. To accommodate this large new group of federal taxpayers, arrangements are being made to place sufficient forms to take care of the needs of the employees with heads of departments in agencies of the state, and disbursing officers of the cities, counties, school districts, etc.

48 Cases Ordered Tossed From List

Lack of Activity in Trial Actions Held Reason for Dismissals

Judge L. H. McMahan yesterday ordered 48 cases in which litigation has apparently been at a stalemate over a period of many months thrown out of court, and continued 14 others for periods ranging from 10 to 30 days pending legal activity looking toward a settlement either in court or outside.

All the cases affected were on the department one docket, and it was believed yesterday that Circuit Judge L. G. Lewelling of department two of the court will have an even more intensive housecleaning when he deals with stymied cases on Tuesday.

Yesterday's court action was preceded by notification of attorneys on both sides of all cases involved of the intention of the judge to throw out cases long pending on which no action had been taken for an appreciable period.

Lawyers were given an opportunity to show cause to the court why cases with which they were associated should not be pruned from the docket. In a score or more of instances, cases were placed on the "true up" list.
