Since Arany's dismissal the airport has been under the temporary direction of Lee U. Eyerly, carnival equipment manufacturer and former airport lessee, Eyerly is among those bidding for the airport lease, it is understood. The airport committee, of

which Dr. Harold Olinger is chairman, has tightened conditions which must be observed by the lessee in its request for bids.
